HOUSE VOTES FOR BAILEY

Ballot Reached on Bailey For Senator in House. Vote 89 For and 35 Against.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, JAN. 22.—THE HOUSE REACHED A VOTE ON BAILEY FOR UNITED STATES SENATOR THIS AFTERNOON, AND THE VOTE RESULTED IN 89 FOR AND 35 AGAINST BAILEY.

3 P. M.—SENATE VOTED 19 FOR AND 2 AGAINST.

INTENSE EXCITEMENT BORDERING ON PANIC

FOLLOWS THE RECURRENCE OF EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS AT THE TOWN OF KINGSTON.

Kingston, Jan. 22.—Intense excitement, bordering on a panic, which reigned among the blacks here last night, following the recurrence of the earthquake shocks of one week ago, has somewhat subsided today, and no serious damage is now feared, even among the ignorant natives. That slight shocks are apt to continue for some time is to be expected.

The foreign population is rapidly leaving the city, and the families of the wealthy English have either gone to London or to the United States.

THANKS TO ROOSEVELT.

Archbishop of Kingston Cables Thanks of the Community.

London, Jan. 22.—Archbishop Nuttall at Kingston cables President Roosevelt of the United States, expressing the thanks of the community for the assistance rendered victims of the earthquake disaster by Admiral Davis, according to a Kingston correspondent of the Evening Standard.

FROST DOES DAMAGE.

Fruit in San Antonio Section Affected by Recent Frosts.

San Antonio, Texas, Jan. 21.—The present cold snap has undoubtedly done thousands of dollars worth of damage to the fruit crop in this section, and should another heavy frost follow the fruit crop will be a total loss. All over this section the fruit trees were in full bloom, that being especially true of pear trees. At Boerne, Comfort, Kerrville, Fredericksburg and other of the mountain towns, it is stated that the orchards resembled spring. They were in full bloom on every side. It is believed that the frost which fell last night was sufficient to practically ruin prospects for fruit. This section is beginning to be a great fruit raising country, and the loss of that crop means a great deal to the producers. Still colder weather, with a heavy frost, is predicted, and there is great uneasiness.

Demanding More Pay.

Chicago, Jan. 22.—The strike committees of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and the Order of Railway Conductors are meeting here and planning to make a demand on the railroads of the Northwest, the Southwest and all west of Chicago, for increased wages and shorter hours. A satisfactory outcome is predicted. Firemen and engineers in the same territory will soon make similar demands.

GRUETT HAS GRIP FULL OF EVIDENCE

HAS RETURNED TO TEXAS AND SAYS HAS ENOUGH EVIDENCE TO DEFEAT BAILEY.

St. Louis, Jan. 22.—J. P. Gruett, former secretary of the Waters Pierce Oil company, has gone back to Texas, carrying with him a grip full of evidence, consisting of vouchers, personal notes, etc., and will appear before the investigating committees at Austin.

Gruett is positive he has evidence with him that will prevent the return of Bailey to the United States senate.

BAILEY MAN ELECTED.

Cunningham Wins Over Hawkins in Twenty-Eighth District.

Dallas, Texas, Jan. 21.—Returns from the election in the Twenty-eighth district to choose a successor to Senator Hawkins, who resigned because he would not support Bailey for reelection, are incomplete. However, the indications are that Cunningham, pro-Bailey, has carried the district by a safe majority.

PRESBYTERIAN UNION IN COURT.

Judge Goodwin Said General Assembly Had the Right to Say.

Brownwood, Texas, Jan. 21.—The case between the different factions of the Cumberland Presbyterian church for possession of the church property, which has been before Judge Goodwin for several days, came to an end this evening. After the judge had taken the matter into consideration, the proceedings being purely argumentative, no evidence having been presented. The court ruled that if the presbyteries consented to the union and reported to the general assembly that the general assembly would then have the authority to effect the union.

This was the contention of defendants, who claimed this was done owing to the time being limited. Judge Goodwin continued the case till the next term of court in order that proof could be made. If this proof is made it means a victory for the union.

PARKER MURDER CASE TODAY.

Charged With Having Killed Haywood Donnell a Year Ago.

Houston, Texas, Jan. 21.—For Tuesday the Jack Parker murder case is set and a special venire has been drawn. He is charged with having murdered Haywood Donnell, who was shot to death on January 15, 1905, in the Turf Exchange.

According to testimony previously taken, there had been much feeling between Parker and Donnell, and when they met the latter sought to leave the room. He had gone as far as the front room when the shooting began and he fell to the floor, expiring in a short time. The case has frequently been called for trial and as frequently continued.

The facts in the case were brought out at the coroner's inquest when all of the witnesses were in the city.

Charged With Jewelry Theft.

Cameron, Texas, Jan. 21.—H. Heugen of Gause has been arrested by Sheriff Holzclaw and brought to jail to answer six complaints filed against him charging burglary of certain stores in Gause. Heugen is a jeweler in Gause, and it is claimed that he procured jewelry from certain stores there. His bond was placed at \$500 in each case, but up to the hour of this report he had not made bond.
