TWENTY MINERS DEAD

And a Score Injured as Result of Explosion in Colorado Mine This Morning.---Great Suffering.

Trinidad, Colo., Jan. 23.—Twenty miners are known to be dead and a score of others injured as a result of an explosion in the Primero mine, the property of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company, which occurred this morning just as the day shift was going to work.

It is impossible at this time to penetrate the shaft so the exact number of dead can not be told. It is known, however, that more than ten miners were killed outright, and that others are pinioned under huge quantities of debris.

The explosion occurred in the mine entrance just as the day shift was entering for the day's work. A great number of men were in the entrance when the unexpected explosion occurred.

There is great suffering on every hand, and the scene is pitiful.

JAMAICA'S GOVERNOR FIERCELY DENOUNCED

BY THE BUSINESS MEN OF KINGSTON—HOSPITALS ARE PLACES OF TORTURE.

Kingston, Jan. 23.—The hospital conditions here are attracting the greatest attention and interest because they are regarded as places of terror. There is a famine in medicine and anesthetics until many operations are made necessary.

The patients are undergoing terrible suffering. Gangrene and tetanus are common.

The Kingston merchants, at a meeting held for the purpose, denounced Governor Swettenham's treatment of Admiral Davis.

The governor's wife is relieving suffering in the field hospitals, which are described as places of torture.

HARRY THAW TRIAL OPENED UP TODAY

THOUSANDS OF SPECTATORS DESIRED ADMITTANCE TO THE COURT ROOM.

New York, Jan. 23.—Harry Kendall Thaw, the self indulgent scion and pampered pet, came to trial today charged with the Murder of Stanford White in the Madison Square Roof Garden on the night of June 25 of last year. Thaw believed that White was seeking to separate him from his wife. The full story of the crime was printed in the newspapers at the time.

It has been fully decided that emotional insanity will be the line of defense. The record of the trial may remain in the criminal trial history of the State without a parallel, owing to the prominence of the parties involved. It is claimed that one million dollars will be spent in the defense of young Thaw, and it is said that half this amount has already been spent on him since the trouble last June.

New York is intensely interested in the case.

The drawing of a jury began when court opened. A venire of two hundred men reported. Thaw aided his lawyers in questioning all prospective jurors.

Thousands of spectators tried to enter the court room, and police had to guard the entrance to control the crowds. More than two hundred newspaper correspondents applied for admission to report the trial for their papers. On the lower floor of the building special wires have been put in for special newspaper use.

Mrs. William Thaw, mother of the prisoner, Mrs. Evelyn Thaw, his wife, Countess Yarmouth, Mrs. George Carnegie, his sisters, and May McKennie and Edward Thaw, his brother, took seats just in the rear of the prisoner and his lawyers.

Thaw entered the court room pale and nervous, and smiled weakly at his relatives.

When the roll call was completed, District Attorney Jerome moved that Thaw be arraigned on the charge of murder.

Charles W. Dryden, an engineer, was the first ventriloquist examined. Jerome learned, after questioning him, that he had previous opinions on the case, and he was excused.

Deming B. Smith, a retired manufacturer, was the first juror selected and was made foreman of the jury. Frank P. Hill, a painter, was the second juror.

William P. Aldrich, treasurer of a mercantile concern, was challenged by the defense, after he was accepted for jury service by the State. While the examination of jurors is in progress the State's alienists are watching Thaw closely.

Morgan O'Brien, an architect, was dismissed on account of having known White personally.

Oliver Jones was excused after conferring with the judge and the district attorney in secret.

Court at this point adjourned until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Thaw was taken back to the Tombs, and smiled as he passed his mother and wife and others of their party.

RECORDS BROKEN IN CONTAGIONS

IN CITY OF CHICAGO—SCARLET FEVER, DIPHTHERIA AND OTHER DISEASES.

Chicago, Jan. 23.—All epidemic records for this city have been broken in the totals of contagious diseases reported within the past twenty-four hours ending this morning.

The number of new cases of scarlet fever reported for the past twenty-four hours are two hundred and twenty-three; diphtheria, fifty-five; miscellaneous cases, twenty-five, making a grand total to date of six thousand, five hundred and sixty-two.

BOY'S POCKET EXPLODED.

Had Rocks and Toy Pistol Caps Mixed When He Fell.

Chappell Hill, Texas, Jan. 22.—Master John Taylor Carlisle, 5 years old, was the victim of an odd accident yesterday. He was carrying in his pocket some rocks for his "nigger shooter" and also a quantity of paper caps for his paper cap pistol, when he fell and struck the pocket, causing an explosion of the paper caps, and setting fire to his clothing. The fire was extinguished with no further damage than burned clothing and a badly frightened little boy.
