## NEWS ASSOCIATIONS ARE CONSOLIDATED

THREE PROMINENT NEWS GATHERING ASSOCIATIONS MERGED INTO ONE ASSOCIATION.

Special to the Herald. New York, July 15.—Announcement is made today of the consolidation of the Scripps-McRae Press Association, the Publishers' Press Association and the Scripps-McRae News Association, into the United Press Association. The consolidated association starts business with 460 newspapers as clients, 400 evening papers and 60 Sunday morning papers. The United Press management now practically controls all the press associations of the country, with the exception of the Associated Press, and the splendid system of news gathering will be improved. It is the same organization improved, which has to its credit such "boats" as the assassination of ex-President McKinley, the death of Queen Victoria, the signing of peace between Russia and Japan, and others. The officers of the new company are: President, John Vandercook; Vice Presidents, Max Balthaser, Oliver Hershman, Andrew McLean. Chairman of the board of directors, H. B. Clark.

## SPECIAL MEETING.

Stockholders of Safety Car Heating Company Meet in Jersey City.

Special to the Herald. New York, July 15.—Stockholders of the Safety Car Heating Company, which controls the American patents to the Pintsch gas system of lighting railroad cars for the United States, Canada and Mexico, and in addition holds the patents for several systems of steam heating cars, held a special meeting in Jersey City today and acted favorably on the proposal of the directors to increase the capital stock from \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000. The increase is to be distributed to stockholders in the form of a stock dividend.

## REAR ADMIRAL EVANS ON HIS WAR BOATS

SAYS HE WILL MATCH THEM WITH NAVY OF ANY FOREIGN POWER IN PEACE OR WAR.

Special to the Herald. Washington, D. C., July 15.—Answering the criticisms on the efficiency of the Atlantic fleet, under his command, Rear Admiral Evans declared today that he would match it against that of any foreign power, either in a peace parade or in the evolutions of war.

## CHINESE QUARTER

Will Be Reopened at San Francisco During Present Week.

Special to the Herald. San Francisco, Cal., July 15.—The present week has been fixed upon as the time for the reopening of the Chinese quarter of San Francisco. Large numbers of the Orientals who have made Oakland and other nearby cities their home since the earthquake disaster have already returned to inhabit the substantial new buildings that have been erected in the old section behind Portsmouth Square. Before the end of the week it is expected that the old Chinese colony will have a population of ten or twelve thousand.

## LAST DAY OF GRACE.

Tuesday Has Been Designated as Day When Telegraphers Walk Out.

Special to the Herald. Chicago, Ill., July 15.—Advices from San Antonio announce that the last day of grace which will be accorded the telegraph companies has been set for Tuesday, by the national officers of the Telegraphers' Union. Two thousand men here are ready to walk out on notice to do so.

## WHOLESALE ARRESTS MADE

As a Result of the Attempt to Take Fallieres' Life in Paris Sunday.

## VERY HEAVY RAINS FALL IN MISSOURI

TOWNS ALONG THE MISSOURI RIVER ARE THREATENED WITH FLOOD—ABOVE FLOOD STAGE.

Special to the Herald. Kansas City, Mo., July 15.—Four and thirty-six one-hundredths inches of rain fell here during the past twenty-four hours. The Missouri river rose to 21.6 feet, six-tenths of an inch above flood stage, and a further rise of 1.5 feet is forecasted by Tuesday night, on account of rains up the river. The Missouri is backed up by the Kaw river, causing water to fill up basements of warehouses in the west bottoms. The river is 1.3 feet above flood stage at St. Joseph.

## JAMES B. DUKE

Sailed For Europe Today—May Wed While Abroad.

Special to the Herald. New York, July 15.—James B. Duke, the millionaire head of the so-called tobacco trust, and Mrs. William Inman, the beautiful society woman of Atlanta, Ga., to whom he has been attentive for the past few months, are included among the members of a party of society folk booked to sail for Europe today. Despite the repeated denials from both Mr. Duke and Mrs. Inman, it is the general belief among their friends that the pair have arranged for their wedding to take place abroad, probably within the next few weeks.

## GOVERNOR FRANTZ

Of Oklahoma Has Republican Nomination For Governor Clinched.

Special to the Herald. Guthrie, Okla., July 15.—With eight hundred out of fifteen hundred and seventy-five delegates instructed for him, with twenty counties yet to hear from, Governor Frantz has the republican gubernatorial nomination clinched. He will open his campaign next Saturday.
