You are hereby commanded to summon the unknown heirs of J. A. Crawford, deceased, and Walter Heap, by making publication of this Citation once in each week for eight successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county, if there be a newspaper published therein; but if not, then in any newspaper published in the 3rd Judicial District, but if there be no newspaper published in said Judicial District, then in a newspaper published in the nearest District to said Judicial District, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Anderson county, to be held at the court house thereof, in Palestine, Texas, on the 4th Monday in November, A. D. 1907, the same being the 25th day of November, A. D. 1907, then and there to answer a petition filed in said court on the 22nd day of August, A. D. 1907, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 7534, wherein Jno. B. Roundtree is plaintiff, and the unknown heirs of J. A. Crawford, deceased, and Walter Heap, are defendants, and said petition alleging being suit for trespass to try title to the two tracts of land hereinafter described. Said petition further alleging on the first day of May, 1907, plaintiff was and now is lawfully seized of said tracts of land, owning the same in fee simple. That on the day and year aforesaid defendant entered upon said premises, and ejected plaintiff therefrom, and withholds from plaintiff the possession thereof, to his great damage. Said two tracts of land are described as follows:

1st tract. Being a part of the Jacob Snively 1-4 league, and beginning at a stake in the s. e. corner of a tract of land 10 ft. wide, sold by Jno. Thynne to Walter Heap, by deed dated May 31, 1881, and recorded in Vol. 32, page 227, Anderson county deed records; thence north 100 ft. to stake; thence west 35 ft. to stake; thence south 100 ft. to stake on line of street; thence east 35 ft. to north line of said street to place of beginning.

2nd tract. Beginning at the s. e. corner of a 25 ft. lot owned by Chas. Delta and now owned by Jane Garrett, said corner being on the north margin of DeBard street, thence with said street 41 ft. more or less to the s. w. corner of the lot first above described; thence north with the west line of said lot 135 ft. to the south line of the lots deed to J. N. Gregg; thence west with the south line 41 ft. more or less to the n. e. corner of the Jane Garrett lot; thence east with the east line of said Jane Garrett lot to the place of beginning.

Plaintiff further says that he now has, and has had peaceable and adverse possession by an actual enclosure of the land above described, cultivating, using and enjoying the same for the period of ten years before defendant's cause of action accrued, and before the commencement of this suit.

That the unknown heirs of J. A. Crawford, deceased, claimed title to said land above described as the heirs of their deceased ancestors, and because the record does not show that said J. A. Crawford ever executed a deed of conveyance to said land and premises.

## LORD MAYOR OF LONDON.

Sir John Charles Bell, Soon to Take Office, 63 Years Old Today.

Sir John Charles Bell, who is soon to take office as Lord Mayor of London, was born October 16, 1844. He received a grammar school education and engaged immediately in business. In 1882 he began his public career as a member of the Court of Common Council, where he served on a number of important committees. In 1894 he was elected to the Court of Aldermen, and in 1902 was made sheriff of the city of London, and was further honored by receiving the rank and title of knight. Sir John is a man of great wealth, being largely interested in brewing companies and a number of other concerns. As Lord Mayor of London he will have no arduous duties to perform, his chief function being to represent the city on great civic occasions. One of the first of these will be to extend the civic welcome to the Emperor and Empress of Germany on the occasion of their visit to London next month. The function will take place at the Guild hall and will be attended with much pomp and ceremony.
