BALLOONISTS LAND IN INDIANA TOWN

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 18.—No word had been received up to 10 o'clock this morning from the balloons carrying J. C. McCoy, Capt. Chandler, Allen Hawley and Augustus Post, which left here Thursday afternoon. McCoy and Chandler, after a long distance record, expect to remain in the air twenty-four hours. They expect to land in Ohio.

Balloonists Heard From.

London, Ind., Oct. 18.—The Hawley balloon landed near this place at 6:10 this morning. Mr. Post, one of the travelers, said the trip last night was delightful.

A message from Leesburg, Ohio, has been received. It reads:
"This message is dropped from the balloon signal corps at 6 o'clock this morning over Hillsboro. We are traveling fast and in a southeasterly direction." The message was signed Chandler and McCoy.

Record of Big Balloon Races.

London, Ind., Oct. 18.—The balloonists who landed here today covered two hundred and twenty-five miles in twelve hours. The greatest height reached was fifteen hundred feet, and the lowest navigation was at four hundred and fifty feet. The average altitude was eight hundred feet. The occupants saw several different towns, but were not sure as to their names. The anchor had been dropped when the balloon passed over South Port.

Gallipolis Saw It.

A DANISH STEAMER CREW LOST AT SEA

Edinburg, Oct. 18.—But three of the crew of twenty-one have been saved from the Danish steamer Alfred Erlanson, which went ashore near St. Abbs Head Thursday, and was battered to pieces during the night. Eighteen of the crew were drowned by being swept from the deck. One of the saved is a woman. On account of the surf it has been impossible to reach the wreck so far.

SEVENTEEN IN FAMILY.

Ellis County Couple Parents of Seventeen Children.
Ennis, Texas, Oct. 17.—G. C. McClain, a farmer of this vicinity, was in town lately purchasing supplies, and in conversation with a friend stated that he and his wife were married twenty-five years ago and have had born to them seventeen children, eleven boys and six girls. Fifteen are living, and of that number three are married. Mr. McClain is 47 years old and his wife is 40.

WAR ON MOSQUITOES WILL BE WAGED

New York, Oct. 18.—Mosquito bites are responsible for a quarter of a million deaths annually, according to Dr. Edward Ayers, who says that malaria and yellow fever and other diseases can be traced directly to the mosquito. The government is trying to reduce the death rate by draining the swamps and otherwise campaigning against the mosquito.

Forgery Case With Jury.

Hillsboro, Texas, Oct. 17.—The testimony in the case of Gene Henson, who is charged with forgery, was concluded about 11:30 o'clock and argument in the case was closed late this afternoon and the charge given to the jury. This is one of the number of cases in which Henson, J. W. Ballard and Clarence Logan are charged with forgery of the name of Major Scofield and others to notes which were cashed at the different banks in this city.

JOHN D.'S NEPHEW DIDN'T KNOW MUCH

New York, Oct. 18.—Wm. G. Rockefeller, John D.'s nephew, was on the witness stand today in the government suit to dissolve the Standard Oil company of New Jersey. He was very nervous, and it was with great difficulty that he retained any show of composure as he was questioned by Attorney Kellogg. William said he was treasurer of the New York company, and assistant treasurer of the New Jersey company. When asked about the two and one-half million dollars loaned to James McDonald, he answered that he only knew that the Anglo-American company of London ordered the Standard to pay the money over. The Standard only acted as banker in the transaction. He professed to know nothing of the Manhattan Oil company, and never heard of the twenty millions paid P. S. Trianer, which is on the Southern Pipe Line company's books. But he promised Kellogg that he would investigate.

FOUR ROBBERS MAKE GOOD HAUL

New York, Oct. 17.—Wheat broke nearly 2 cents a bushel and corn 2-5-8 cents today. Under the demoralized condition growing out of a smash in Liverpool prices, lessened export interest and disquieting Wall street conditions, December wheat touched 1.13 3-8, or 5c down from the recent high point.

SHERIFF EGG ACQUITTED
