CONCRETE BLOCK PLANT WILL NOT ABANDON FIELD

Will Begin Operation Here the Last of the Month—Machinery Has Arrived In the City.

A concrete block factory will soon be in operation in this city. Secretary Sterne of the Board of Trade has received a letter from Mr. P. A. Bowsher of Terre Haute, Indiana, who writes that he will be here and ready to begin manufacturing, if possible, by the twentieth of this month. The machinery for the plant has arrived, and is now stored at the local freight depot. This is a valuable enterprise for the city, as the promoters say they will be able to manufacture a building block that will be considerably cheaper than brick and superior in every way as a building stone.

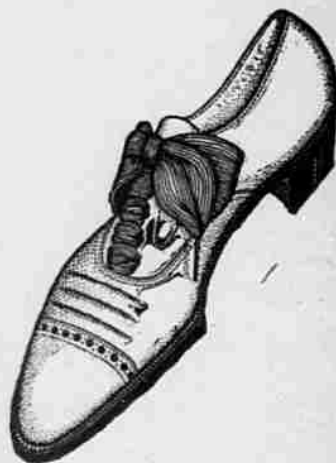
