Just to think of the energy being expended in politics now that could be expended on the farm and in other useful occupations. What a waste, what a waste.

Private citizens of Denton have contracted for 1100 feet of concrete sidewalks to be built right away. Just suppose Palestine was doing something like that.

Denton has passed an anti-chicken ordinance that puts the old scratching, annoying hen out of business. Under its provisions every man must keep his chickens at home.

At Dallas Saturday a big anti-Bailey demonstration has been arranged for. It will be especially a local affair, but many visitors are expected. And with the big Bailey meeting on at Fort Worth on the same date there will be something doing in that part of Texas.

No, dear, H. C. P. will not attend the Fort Worth meeting. The governor of Texas has often sent him a pressing invitation to visit Texas, and even Texas sheriffs have been sent out to bring him here, but he will not come. That is one Bailey man that can be counted absent.

In this tax controversy the odds are all with the governor, and it is hardly necessary for him to go on the stump to defend his attitude. It is but simple justice to equalize taxes as far as is possible, and that is what the full rendition would do. Those who are making the howl are the same fellows who have not been coming up with their just share of the taxes.

Even Bailey's strongest supporters are inclined to apologize for him, and express regret that he had dealings of any kind with H. Clay Pierce. But they say it did not corrupt Bailey. He got the money, but they did not buy his influence. It was Bailey, you know, and in their eyes Bailey can do no wrong. Rot. Bailey is very human. He proved that by accepting big fees for work done for trusts while drawing pay to attend to the people's business. And no public official has a right to do that.

Sometimes these things are brought about by the unwarranted acts of negroes themselves. Whenever they get too big or too smart they will find people who are ready to call them down. It is exceedingly unfortunate for a negro to forget his place. It is equally to be regretted that extreme measures are sometimes deemed necessary to make the negro realize that the white people are going to rule.

POLITICS AND POLITICIANS.

C. C. Featherstone of Laurens has announced his candidacy for governor of South Carolina in the primaries this summer. Mr. Featherstone was a candidate for governor in 1898 on the prohibition platform and was defeated by a narrow majority.

Senator Frye of Maine, who is president pro tem of the senate and a man of consequence in New England in politics, has declared his adherence to the candidacy of Secretary Taft. He has declined, however, to serve as a delegate to the Chicago convention.

Weather Conditions.

The storm over Wyoming yesterday has divided; one section has moved to Iowa, raising the temperature from the lakes to the Gulf and east to the Atlantic coast. It is as warm in the Ohio valley as in Central Texas. The other section of the storm has remained over the Rocky Mountain states; a cold area and high pressure has wedged between the two sections and now covers the West and Northwest. The drift of this cold is towards the lake region. It was below zero this morning in northern Montana and South Dakota. The line of freezing temperature extends to Kansas. A decided change in temperature is likely on Saturday morning in the vicinity of Palestine; fair weather is indicated tonight and Friday; colder Friday.

To Water Consumers

The use of hand hose without a nozzle for any purpose whatever is prohibited, and in no case shall a nozzle larger than one-eighth inch diameter be allowed and the use of which shall not exceed four hours per day, and for no purpose other than as stated in the application and for such use as payment is made.

In no case shall any one be permitted to use water for sprinkling streets or sidewalks unless special terms be made for same.

Permits for sprinkling lawns will be issued from May 1st to November 1st not to exceed four hours in any one day, nor at any other time than between the hours of six and eight a. m. and five and eight p. m., which shall constitute the season for sprinkling, and for which the entire payment must be made in advance, according to the season rates.

In case of fire, no hose shall be used other than for the fire, and there shall be no other use of water except as absolutely necessary so long as the fire pressure is on.

Any person violating any of the foregoing rules shall forfeit all payments made and the supply of water shall be at once stopped without any notice, and shall not be again turned on without an extra charge of \$1.00 for the trouble of turning off and on.

The company reserves the right to make such amendments or alterations in these rules and regulations, as in their judgment the protection and preservation of the works shall demand.

HELL IS THE REAL THING

A State of Insatiable and Tormenting Desires, Said Evangelist Wm. J. Lockhart Last Night.

Evangelist Lockhart preached a great sermon on a great theme last night. The church was packed; every seat was taken, and hundreds were unable to find seats. The officers of the church are arranging to increase the seating capacity of the building.

The singing was the best of the meeting thus far, and thrilled the hearts of all present. Mr. Lintt has already shown himself a master leader. He has been suffering with a severe cold for several days, but it is hoped he will be able to sing his special songs tonight.

A special service in honor of mother is announced for tomorrow night. Tonight the first invitation will be extended, and it is hoped that many will come out for Christ.

The following is a brief synopsis of last night's sermon on "Is there a Hell?"

"I assure you my subject is not a pleasant one. It has only been in the last two years that I have preached on the subject of hell. I found I was neglecting that of which the bible says much. You ask me, is there a hell? and I reply, it matters not what I believe, but it does matter a great deal what the Book says." Here the evangelist read several passages from the bible dealing with his theme. "You ask me, is there a hell? and I reply, I believe there is because the bible says there is. I believe there is a hell because of experience and observation. What means sin in the world? Wherever I find sin I find hell. Ask me, is there a hell, and I turn the question back at you. Go to the embezzler and ask him, 'Is there a hell?' Go to the murderer and ask him, 'Is there a hell?' Stand beside yonder woman in the scarlet robe and ask her if there is a hell. Ah, my friends, sin is the beginning of hell. Sin plus eternity is hell.

"You ask me what kind of a place is hell? I reply it need not necessarily be a physical place, though we may use that word in speaking of it. The bible says hell is a place of outer darkness, and the bible also says it is a fiery furnace. It could not be both. The bible also speaks of hell as a bottomless pit, and a lake of fire. It could not be both. Therefore, we know that these are figures of speech. However, that does not make hell less real, but the more terrible. Figurative language is the strongest language man can use, and God can use no stronger than these used in the bible to describe hell.

"Hell is a place of insatiable and tormenting desires. Jesus describes the rich man with his parched and burning tongue longing for water. This is the worst physical torture known to man. Jesus used it to help us understand how in hell the soul will have an insatiable longing never gratified.

"Hell is a place of shame, a place where there will be the eternal consciousness of outraged and dishonored conscience. Nothing is more terrible than that.

"Hell will be a place without hope. And finally hell will be a place of memory. The lost soul cannot banish the memory of sin. Jesus said to the rich man, 'Son, Remember,' and that man was in hell. Turn from Christ in

these meetings and be lost, and you will remember this sermon, these songs, these invitations. And in hell perhaps your cry will be, 'I wish I had, I wish I had.' Tonight put your sin-sick soul in the care of the great physician, before sin has completely conquered your will."
