The man of fixed convictions always draws around him a lot of good friends and energetic enemies. And the man who has no conviction never has many of either.

With a new set of officers let us get busy again with the sanitary condition of the city. Those open closets along the sewer line already condemned are still there in defiance of the law. Mr. City Marshal, do your duty.

Complaint is made of the filthy condition of the open storm sewer at the lower part of Spring and Main streets, around the Sterne property and on Avenue A. Here is work for the street gang. Let us maintain a clean town.

The Anderson county lakes and streams are being stocked with the famous strawberry trout, and in a short time it is going to take a big crop of strawberries to feed them. We prefer fish fattened on strawberries to those fed with live rabbits. The meat is much more delicious.

The Herald hopes every farmer in Anderson county will make it a point to go out and look at the split log drag road Road Superintendent Pierce has made on the Magnolia road, west of the city. It speaks for itself, and shows what can be done with the drag. If the county had fifty or one hundred of these drags ready to work on the roads after each rain the county would soon have some good roads.

The Herald is constantly receiving letters from people in Indiana and other states in that section asking us about the Union Central Construction company, as to what they had to sell, etc. The Herald refers the questions to the Palestine Board of Trade for answers. This is part of the business of the Board, to answer questions about the county and its opportunities. People wanting this information should write to the Board and get it straight. The Herald has heretofore given its opinion in the premises.

The school election, to authorize the levy of a small tax to create a larger school fund, is a most important election, and every qualified voter should give the matter his honest consideration before casting a vote. It has been demonstrated that the schools cannot be successfully conducted with the funds now available for school purposes. The people of this city cannot afford to let the children be deprived of the very best school advantages for the want of funds. Before you make up your mind to vote against such a proposition figure on what such a tax would cost you, and then figure how much it costs you to pay one or two months' tuition for your children. The tax is the cheaper of the two propositions by more than half.

POLITICS AND POLITICIANS.

Colonel James Hamilton Lewis, who has announced his candidacy for the democratic nomination for governor of Illinois, has had a varied career. Born in Virginia and educated at the University of Virginia, he began the practice of law in Georgia. In 1886 he was located at Seattle, Wash., and in 1892 was the democratic candidate

for governor of that state. In 1897-99 he was a member of congress from Washington, and twice he was the nominee for United States senator.

Governor Glenn is being warmly commended in North Carolina for his voluntary withdrawal from the United States senatorial race for the sake of harmony. The governor intends to devote all his energies during the next few weeks to help make North Carolina a "dry" state at the prohibition election next month.

A boom has been launched for Fred E. White, former congressman from the Sixth Iowa district, for the democratic nomination for governor of the Hawkeye state. Mr. White was twice a candidate of his party for the governorship, and both times was defeated by Leslie M. Shaw. He was elected to congress in 1890.

George Johnstone of Newberry is the latest candidate to enter the race or United States senator from South Carolina to succeed Senator F. B. Lary, who is filling the unexpired term of the late Senator Latimer. Other candidates for the office are ex-governor D. C. Heyward, ex-governor John Gary Evans and O. B. Martin.

John J. Hamilton, who has announced his candidacy for the republican nomination for governor of Iowa, is one of the best known citizens of that state. He was born in Pennsylvania, but as a boy he removed with his parents to Iowa. For twenty-one years he was connected with the Des Moines Daily News as reporter, editor and proprietor. Mr. Hamilton is regarded as an authority on the race problem, of which subject he has made an exhaustive study.

CANNING BERRIES.

(Texas Home Canner.)

The season for canning small fruits is now on. The strawberry is the first to ripen, but usually in the latitude of Palestine there is not much of this fruit canned before May first, as the price of the fresh fruit prior to this time is generally high enough to justify shipping the fresh berries. But right here the all-important and vital question confronts the fruit grower: How can I get the most net profit out of my product? The strawberry can be used in many ways—sold fresh, canned, made into preserves, jellies, jams, wine and vinegar, and the point to determine is which of these ways will enable me to get the most profit out of my fruit? In many instances it is best to combine different ways by selling in the fresh state as long as the market is good and prices satisfactory, but right here we want to ask a few questions to bring out the experience of others on these points, viz: At what price does it pay best to sell fresh or preserve? Strawberry preserves are a good seller and where made right they command a ready sale at good prices. We have recently seen and sampled a very fine grade of strawberry vinegar which was made from berries that were not saleable as fresh fruit. Each grower must determine for himself by making some experiments the best way for him to get the most out of his berries or other product. Dewberries are also ripening now and are a good fruit to can and very profitable. The berries should be picked before they get too ripe so as to mash up in handling. They should be washed clean and can filled full of berries. If no water is put in the can, just soldered and sealed up while cold, then cooked under boiling water for about ten minutes, and put in cold water as quickly as the cans are taken out of the hot water, they will retain their color much better, as well as their flavor. Use two-pound cans for both dewberries and blackberries. A light sugar syrup for the dewberries and blackberries will improve their flavor.

DILLEY HOME ROBBED

Burglars Visited the Dilley Home Last Night and Carried Away Silverware, Etc.

Palestine is evidently entertaining a set of professional house breakers at this time. Sunday night the homes of Messrs. W. E. Swift and Hyman Pearlstone were visited and at each place a lot of silverware was stolen. Again last night thieves entered the home of Mr. G. E. Dilley, on South Sycamore street, and again the intruders showed a partiality for silverware and cut glass. The thieves gained an entrance into this home through a window, and made a raid on the silver and china closets. It is estimated that possibly four or five hundred dollars' worth of silver and china were taken here. As yet there seems to be no clue to the identity of the thieves. However, it is believed by those who have investigated the matter that the same parties robbed all of the three residences, as the work has a similarity. The people should keep a watch for these intruders and assist the officers in making arrests. It is likely other homes will be entered. The officers are working on the case, and hope to make arrests.

For Palestine and vicinity: Tonight and Wednesday fair. Stationary temperature. Minimum temperature, 60. Maximum temperature, 80.

Weather Conditions.

The storm center has moved from the Panhandle to East Texas; its trough is as far east as Georgia and as far north as Chicago. It is attended by precipitation over that area, the Ohio valley and Western states.

Rain is falling this morning in Ohio, Missouri, Tennessee and the District of Columbia. Heavy rains occurred in Arkansas, Tennessee and Mississippi and heavy snow in Colorado and Western Nebraska. The high pressure area is over Lake Superior, attended by temperature in the thirties; the coldest section (30 to 32) is in Utah, Nevada and Nebraska.

Fair and slightly cooler weather is indicated tonight and Wednesday in the vicinity of Palestine.
