

SALE OF RARE OLD COINS

Coins and Medals Belonging to Geo. F. Ulex of Hamburg Were on the Market Today.

Berlin, May 11.—Agents for several American coin collectors were present at Frankfurt today at the opening of the widely discussed sale of the coins and medals of North, Central and South America, belonging to George F. Ulex of Hamburg, one of the greatest of European coin collectors. Among the pieces to be sold at auction is what is supposed to have been the first coin issued in America, which is ascribed to Sir Walter Raleigh's unsuccessful attempt in 1854 to establish a colony on the coast of North Carolina.

The collection to be sold embraces more than four thousand lots of coins and medals, many of which have not been offered for sale in recent years, and it is particularly complete in the early Spanish coins which from time to time supplied the need for a circulation medium throughout the greater part of the New World.

CHAS. W. FAIRBANKS

Vice President of the United States, Has a Birthday—Fifty-Six Years Old Today—His Record.

Charles Warren Fairbanks, vice president of the United States, was born May 11, 1852, in Union county, Ohio, and received his education at Ohio Wesleyan University. In his early career he was engaged in newspaper work, which he abandoned to study law, and in 1874 was admitted to the bar. He removed to Indianapolis the same year and began the practice of his profession, in which he was eminently successful. Though he took a more or less active interest in politics for many years he never held public office prior to his election to the United States senate in 1897. Mr. Fairbanks was re-elected to the senate in 1903. In 1898 he was appointed a member of the Joint High Commission which met in Quebec for the adjustment of questions between

SHOW OPENS IN LONDON

Ten Million Dollar Undertaking Was Opened to the Public at London Today—Many Buildings.

London, May 11.—Imre Kiralfy's greatest undertaking, the Franco-British Exhibition, opened its gates to the public today and will continue through the coming summer. The promoters expect to have thirty million visitors, a large proportion of whom will come from the other side of the channel.

The exhibition is the largest enterprise of its kind ever undertaken in England. It occupies a park of nearly 150 acres, conveniently located in a North London suburb. A score of spacious exhibition palaces house a fairland of exhibits illustrating the science, art and industry of Great Britain and France. The buildings are large and artistic structures, built for the most part of steel, iron, concrete and plastered. The one big feature is the giant Machinery Hall, which is the largest building ever erected at any exhibition. It contains a total floor space of over eight acres.
