BIG STORM DOES DAMAGE

Swept States of Kansas, Missouri and Illinois—Several People Killed and Property Lost.

St. Louis, Mo., May 22.—The worst storm of the year swept the states of Kansas, Missouri and Illinois last night and early today. Three people are known to have lost their lives, and the property damage will run into the thousands. Mrs. Fred Grothe was killed by a tornado near Lincoln, Nebraska, and two children of Fred Baker were killed near Linn, in the same state. Leona Coffelght was shocked by lightning in this city, and is not expected to live. Two thousand men have been thrown out of employment by reason of damage done to factories and mills in this city alone.

MR. LILLEY MAY ESCAPE JEROME TO PROSECUTE

Prosecution Before the Present Congress, But Williams May Take Action In the Matter.

Washington, D. C., May 22.—The republican members of the house have practically decided not to allow any attempt to be made to expel Congressman Lilley because of his failure to sustain his charges in the submarine scandal during the present session. However, it is announced from the republican side that the matter may be taken up for action in the December term. John Sharp Williams has about determined to offer a resolution calling for the immediate expulsion of the member, and the fight this would bring on may delay the time of adjournment of the present congress.

MINING BUREAU

May Be Voted For By Senate—John Mitchell Favored For the Head.

Washington, D. C., May 22.—The senate committee on mining is today considering the bill to establish a bureau of mining under the department of the interior. The house recently passed the bill creating this new bureau, and the senate is expected to follow suit. It is understood the head of the new department will be offered to John Mitchell, late president of the Western Federation of Miners, if he will accept.

Heavy Onion Shipments.

Laredo, Texas, May 21.—Heavy onion shipments have commenced again, over ninety cars going out of Laredo since last Sunday, the total to date being over one thousand. The onions are now in better condition when they reach the market than those shipped during the recent wet weather.

New York, May 22.—Stuyvesant Fish, Jr., has gone into Wall street and takes a job as clerk for the Solomon Banking company, and it is reported that he is making good. Young Fish plans to learn finance from the bottom up, and has his eye on a stock exchange seat eventually.

Mae Wood on Charge of Perjury—The Grand Jury is Investigating Her Case—She is Unconcerned.

New York, May 22.—The grand jury is investigating the charges of perjury and forgery against Miss Mae Wood, growing out of her suit against Senator Platt for divorce. District Attorney Jerome has announced that he intends to prosecute Miss Wood with the same vigor that characterized his prosecution in the Harry Thaw case. It is expected that the trial against the woman will begin shortly. Miss Wood appears to be unconcerned about the charges filed against her, and says powerful Washington influences will come to her aid at the proper time.
