## DR. WORSHAM WAS ON THE STAND TODAY

he knew it was wrong to kill Pierce. On cross-examination he said that for fifteen years Tubbs' hobby had been to acquire property without paying for it, whether useful or not. He had several conversations with Tubbs about the gasoline engine over which he had shot Pierce, and that he fairly worshipped it.

Dr. E. B. Parsons testified that he had observed Tubbs in jail and had heard the evidence on the trial. He thought Tubbs was sufficiently intelligent to know it was wrong to kill Pierce. That Tubbs had a conscience, but that he was erratic and a crank. He did not believe that Tubbs was a paranoiac. He was cross-examined at great length relative to the co-ordination of mental faculties, and their functions and relations. He gave it as his opinion that conscience was a faculty that was developed from surroundings. Judgment was developed by co-relation of circumstances.

George M. Wofford of Athens testified that he is a cousin of Tubbs and that they lived with the same aunt for a number of years when Tubbs was small. Tubbs never has talked very much to anyone except on his schemes to acquire property without

paying for it. He seemed to think it was right to get it that way. When witness was cashier of the bank Tubbs claimed at one time to have \$1,800.00 on deposit, though he had no account there. Thinks Tubbs' mind is unsound and that he thought he was doing right to shoot Dave Pierce.

Dr. B. M. Worsham, superintendent of the asylum at Austin, testified there were three stages of paranoia. That it first manifested itself about the age of puberty, and after several years developed into a fixed delusion that the patient was some person other than he was, or that people were trying to persecute him or keep him from his own. This was the dangerous stage. The third stage is the complete abandonment of their mind to that delusion. It is a progressive form of insanity, and the third stage is usually reached by the time the patient is thirty or forty years old. The witness had never heard of a case where the dangerous stage was reached when the patient was forty-five years old. Paranoia is an infrequent form of insanity and there is usually some hereditary predisposition. He thought the influences to insanity as detailed in the history of Tubbs' family were too remote to indicate such a predisposition. Emotional insanity is not a proper classification of any form of insanity, and an irresistible impulse is not a criterion of insanity.

The witness thought that the evidence showed that Tubbs was peculiar and eccentric, and that he was a defective, but if he was ever sane he is still sane. Thinks the evidence establishes his sanity, and that he knew it was wrong to kill Pierce. In the absence of evidence showing that

his mind has grown worse continuously, and that he has delusions, he said he could not pronounce him a paranoiac. The evidence has not indicated that he had delusions indicating paranoia, nor has it shown a progressive tendency of his eccentricity. A true paranoiac will insist on his sanity, even when he is on trial, and will dispute any contention to the contrary. He will denounce them in the court room, even, as false, though he may be on trial for his life.

Dr. Worsham was cross-examined at great length by Mr. Miller on the relations of the mental faculties to each other. He was made to distinguish between conscience and consciousness, to define reason, judgment, and other faculties, and to state the extent of their interdependence. He stated that judgment and conscience alike depended on the faculty of consciousness.

A great number of instances showing peculiar conduct on Tubbs' part were recalled to the witness and he stated they showed he was a very unusual character and eccentric. He classified him as a defective, or one who was out of the ordinary from his birth, while a person with an unsound mind would be one who became unbalanced after birth.

## PREPRIED BY LANDIS

The Fifth Stay In the Case of Herman Billek, Sentenced to Hang Today For Murder of Mary Vzral.

Chicago, June 12.—Federal Judge Landis today reprieved Herman Billek, sentenced to hang at noon today for the murder of Mary Vzral, until the United States supreme court has considered the case. All preparations had been completed for the execution, and the last rites had been administered to Billek. This is the fifth time the condemned man has received a stay of execution.

St. Louis, June 12.—The Mississippi is still rising and thousands of acres of land and miles of railway tracks are under water. The crest of the flood is expected here Sunday. The loss to crops in the overflowed territory is estimated at \$50,000.
