Living the precarious life of a bootblack and newsboy, he slept in doorways, areas, in barrels. He had but one ambition. He dearly loved a fight and wanted to be a prize fighter. For several years he made his living as a saloon bouncer.

Can any good come out of the Bowery?

Yes. At thirty years of age Kildare came into contact with a gentle girl who was a schoolteacher—a sweet, affectionate, wise young woman, pure as a pearl. The association changed the whole current of his life. The young woman helped Kildare to the rudiments of an education. As he studied his ideals of life were changed. He had a hard struggle to let go of the old wild ways. Finally he got employment in the circulation department of a newspaper. He studied every spare moment.

One could well wish in reading the story of Owen Kildare that he might have married his Mamie Rose, the girl with whom he fell in love and who wrought so great a change in him. But fate was unkind—or was it unkind?—and his idol died.

To make a long story short, Owen Kildare began to write stories, submitting them to the editor of the newspaper where he worked for criticism. He persevered until his sketches possessed value. They were heart to heart stories from real life.

Owen Kildare is now well known in journalistic circles. In newspaper parlance, his stories of slum life are esteemed "good stuff." He has also written several books with good success. "Mamie Rose," the story of his resurrection from the depths, made a hit.

To Water Consumers

The use of hand hose without a nozzle for any purpose whatever is prohibited, and in no case shall a nozzle larger than one-eighth inch diameter be allowed and the use of which shall not exceed four hours per day, and for no purpose other than as stated in the application and for such use as payment is made.

In no case shall any one be permitted to use water for sprinkling streets or sidewalks unless special terms be made for same.

Permits for sprinkling lawns will be issued from May 1st to November 1st not to exceed four hours in any one day, nor at any other time than between the hours of six and eight a. m. and five and eight p. m., which shall constitute the season for sprinkling, and for which the entire payment must be made in advance, according to the season rates.

In case of fire, no hose shall be used other than for the fire, and there shall be no other use of water except as absolutely necessary so long as the fire pressure is on.

Any person violating any of the foregoing rules shall forfeit all payments made and the supply of water shall be at once stopped without any notice, and shall not be again turned on without an extra charge of \$1.00 for the trouble of turning off and on.

The company reserves the right to make such amendments or alterations in these rules and regulations, as in their judgment the protection and preservation of the works shall demand.

LATE NEWS NOTES.

Mobile, Ala., June 15.—The annual convention of the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants' Union opened in this city today with delegates present from many cities of the United States and Canada.

Berlin, June 15.—Today was the twentieth anniversary of Emperor William's accession to the throne. Throughout the empire the anniversary was observed as a general holiday. The capital was handsomely decorated in honor of the occasion.

Lima, O., June 15.—Lima is lavishly decorated with the national colors in honor of the national day. The department of Ohio, whose annual fair will be in session here next three days. Twenty thousand visitors are expected.

Amsterdam, June 15.—Delegates from twenty-two countries are attending the conference of the International Woman's Suffrage Alliance, which opened here today. Rev. Anna Shaw, Miss Lucy B. Anthony, Mrs. Catharine Waugh McCullough and Mrs. Ella S. Stewart of Illinois are among the Americans present.

Fort Worth, Texas, June 15.—Many visitors are here for the fifteenth annual meeting of the Texas Woman's Press Association. The meeting is to have its formal opening tonight and the business sessions will continue over Tuesday and Wednesday. Elaborate arrangements have been made for the entertainment of the visitors.

Toronto, Ont., June 15.—The Canadian Pacific railway has fixed today as the date for the opening of the new Subury cut-off and the inauguration of through service between this city and Winnipeg. Transcontinental trains are henceforth to be run from Toronto to the Pacific coast.

Toronto, Ont., June 15.—Great interest is manifested in the meeting of the supreme court of the Independent Order of Foresters in this city tomorrow to consider the proposed revision in rates. The proposed increase has already met with much opposition. The order has a membership of nearly 300,000 in Canada and the United States.

New York, June 15.—Memorial services to commemorate the fourth anniversary of the steamer General Slocum disaster were held in Lutheran cemetery in Brooklyn today. Nearly a thousand persons attended the services, among them being several score of actual survivors of the tragic excursion.

Rio Janeiro, June 15.—The Brazilian national exposition, for which preparations have been going forward for more than a year, was opened today. It will continue until the middle of September. The exhibition, which is commercial and industrial in its character, is in celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the opening of the ports of Brazil to international commerce.

Saratoga, N. Y., June 15.—The World's Temperance Centennial Congress resumed its sessions here this morning with an increased attendance of delegates. Reports were presented during the forenoon showing the progress of the temperance movement throughout the world. The formal welcoming exercises are to take place in Convention Hall this evening. The exchange of greetings will be followed by a Good Templars' reception, the speakers to include George F. Cottrell of Seattle, Wash., National Grand Chief Templar, and Edward Wavrinisky of Stockholm, a member of the Swedish parliament.
