## THE COMING OF PIERCE

Attorney General's Department Hopes That the Oil Magnate Will Make Good His Promise.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 6.—The attorney general's office hopes the report will prove true that Henry Clay Pierce, chairman of the Waters Pierce Oil company, will voluntarily come to Texas next week to stand trial on the long-pending indictment against him. It will mark the beginning of the end of a case that has cost the state of Texas a vast amount of time and money. Every effort will be put forth to try the case without unnecessary delay. It will be called before Judge Calhoun of the Fifty-third district court, but it is believed an effort will be made to get a change of venue.

The troubles between the state of Texas and the Waters Pierce Oil company date back nearly a decade, but the charge against H. Clay Pierce on which he is to be placed on trial dates back to two years ago this month. It was in November, 1906, that the Travis county grand jury returned an indictment against Mr. Pierce charging him with false swearing. The indictment charges that Pierce, on May 31, 1900, made an affidavit that the Waters Pierce Oil company had not entered into any agreement or understanding with any corporation, partnership, firm or individual to regulate the price of any article or commodity. It charges that at the time Pierce made the affidavit he knew that the company had entered into an agreement with the Standard Oil company, John D. Rockefeller, John D. Archbold, H. H. Rogers and others to control the price of oil in Texas, and that the Standard Oil company had

acquired a controlling interest in the Waters Pierce Oil company.

The vigorous fight made by Mr. Pierce to prevent extradition to this state to stand trial is familiar to all newspaper readers. His last resource was exhausted two weeks ago when the supreme court of the United States denied his motion for a rehearing and sustained the lower court's decision that Mr. Pierce must stand trial before the Texas courts.

Perjury in the state of Texas is punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary for a term of not less than five years. The minimum punishment for false swearing is two years.

### AN ACT OF CHARITY.

Police Officer Secures Bed For Poor Woman and Children.

It was at the passenger station and the hour was midnight. Officer — never mind his name. Suffice it to say he was a Palestine policeman on the night watch. A woman, evidently weak or sick, and three small children got off the train. A little girl not over ten had in her arms a wee bit of humanity that could not have been over two weeks old; the woman held the hand of another; a tot scarcely old enough to walk. They stood on the platform for a moment bewildered, and looked as if they knew not what to do. Then they went into the waiting room. The mother was in tears. Tenderly she laid the only wrap the quartette possessed on a bench, and placed the baby upon it. Then the little ten year old girl took the other baby in her lap. The officer thought it was then appropriate for him to approach and ask some questions. And he did. He found out they were in destitute circumstances. The husband was a laboring man, struggling for an existence, and he had gone to Oklahoma to secure work. In the meantime another had

come to be fed and clothed. The man managed to send barely enough money for a ticket for the mother, and sick and penniless she had started to him. She was not aware that she would have to lay over with her helpless ones at Palestine, as the night train did not make continuous connection. What was she to do? The gallant officer told her he would secure her a bed, and he did. He went to a rooming house, and told of the woman and children, and said he wanted to buy them a bed, and get them something to eat. The proprietor said you cannot buy a bed here under the circumstances, but you can have it, and anything else we have. Bring them over. It is on the house.

The woman and children were thus provided for, and they continued their trip the next day.

### Hable Pottery Now Operating.

E. W. Hable, who came to Palestine from Athens a few months ago, has established a pottery manufacturing business, now has his factory running. To a person who has never seen such work as this done it is quite a novelty. To see a person take a pound or so of clay and in about a minute by means of his hand, have it shaped into a jug or jar or something similar is almost a wonder itself. Mr. Hable is an expert in his line and is turning out a large quantity of jugs, jars, flower pots and the like. This is a worthy enterprise and no doubt it will be a profitable one. Palestine needs more such concerns and should cooperate in every way possible.
