- 1708—Baron John Lovelace appointed governor of New York.

A LOOK AHEAD.

One thing may be set down as a sure thing, and that is that next year is going to be very interesting in Texas from a political standpoint. If all of the things that have happened in this big state within the last year have served to crystallize public interest in public matters, then they have not been without their value.—Palestine Herald.

However the matter may come about, there is no doubt that next year will see a better, healthier public sentiment in Texas and a better consideration of state affairs by the electors who will name the next administration. The Campbell policies will be heard of no more after the present administration shall end. The present executive may have the belief that the people of Texas, endorsed his policies two years ago, but he will learn that he is mistaken when the electorate shall have a chance to determine upon who shall be his successor in office. There has been a change of sentiment in Texas, and the change will be recorded next summer. It is to be hoped that no personal issues will arise to obscure the real temper of the people on fundamental questions when the time shall come to act upon them.—San Antonio Express.

We are not so sure that the Express is right, but granting that it speaks a true prophecy, the lesson we get out of the condition is that if the people of the state do not want platform demands executed into laws they should quit putting such platforms and planks into their deliberations through state conventions. Governor Campbell has followed the instructions of his party, the people who elected him to office, and he is in good faith, and no blame can be laid at his door unless it be that he is too good a democrat and has followed literally his instructions, instead of regarding such instructions as vote catchers to be disregarded after election day. The fact of the whole matter is, people should take more part in the making of platforms, and study the needs of the state from the business end rather than the political, with the purpose of advancing the industrial interests of the state rather than the political fortunes of a few office seekers. In the past we have been too much inclined to let a few politicians arrange our platforms, and then later discovered in some instances we have been traded a gold brick. No man's political future should be allowed to stand in the way of Texas and her development.

POLITICS AND POLITICIANS.

On his southern trip next fall President Taft will visit every southern state, including Texas.

United States Senator Morgan G. Bulkeley of Connecticut has given his friends to understand that he will be a candidate for re-election on the expiration of his present term.

In the state of Washington the equal suffrage amendment passed the senate, 30 to 3. It passed the house some weeks earlier, by a vote of 70 to 18.

Robert B. Glenn, former governor of North Carolina, has taken to the

pulpit and intends to devote the remainder of his life to religious work.

A boom has been started for A. E. Sisson of Erie as a candidate for the republican nomination for governor of Pennsylvania. Mr. Sisson is now a member of the state senate.

Asher C. Hinds, parliamentarian of congress, has announced his candidacy for the republican congressional nomination in the First district of Maine.

The judiciary of Montana has been removed from the domain of politics, and accordingly from the domination of political parties, by a law recently enacted by the legislature of that state.

A call has been issued in New York City for a meeting to effect a combination of influential men of all parties to oppose Tammany Hall at the forthcoming mayoralty election in the metropolis.

John Horn, in point of years the oldest living ex-member of the Pennsylvania legislature, celebrated his ninetieth birthday a few days ago at his home in Easton. Mr. Horn was a member of the legislature in 1853-4.

Former Governor Charles B. Aycock of North Carolina recently declined a proposal to identify himself with a leading law firm in New York. He expects to be elected to the United States senate two years hence.

In the event of the death or disability of Speaker Cannon, General Bingham of Pennsylvania would in all probability be elected to the speakership, in accordance with the custom of the house to elect the oldest member in point of service. General Bingham has served in every congress since 1879.

Major Minnamscoot, the mule offered by William J. Bryan during the campaign of last year to the county showing the largest democratic gain, is claimed by Esmeralda county, Nevada. The democratic vote in 1908 in that county showed the remarkable gain of 694 per cent, as compared with the vote in 1900 and 1904.

The anti-saloon element in Virginia is not altogether satisfied with the workings of the local option law in that state. As the liquor element is also dissatisfied with present conditions it is not unlikely that politicians in the Old Dominion soon will be faced with a straight-up prohibition contest.

George T. Oliver, who is to succeed Philander Knox in the senate, has an interesting career. He was born in Ireland in 1848, while his parents were visiting in that country. He practiced law in Pittsburg for ten years and then retired from the profession to engage in iron and steel manufacturing. Since 1900 he has been interested largely in the management of his newspaper properties in Pittsburg. He is reputed to be a millionaire several times over.

The pressure is below normal west of the Mississippi river. Dry conditions rule in the cotton belt, excepting South Texas. The high pressure area continues over the lake region and Ohio Valley, attended by fair weather and a temperature ranging between 24 and 32 degrees. Freezing weather prevails over the North-western states, lakes, Ohio valley and part of the North and Middle Atlantic states. The storm over the Rocky Mountains yesterday is now central over Nevada and Utah, with a central pressure of 29.56 inches. Its trough extends south to South Texas; rain is falling this morning at Del Rio and San Antonio.

Cloudy and unsettled conditions are indicated for tonight and Wednesday in the vicinity of Palestine, with showers probable either tonight or Wednesday.
