

MACARTHUR IS RETIRED

Twelfth and Last American Officer to Reach the Highest Rank in the Army.

(Herald Special.)

Washington, D. C., June 2.—After an honorable and eventful military career of forty-seven years, Lieutenant General Arthur MacArthur, the twelfth and last American officer to reach the highest rank in the army, was retired today. George Washington was the first on the list. He was appointed lieutenant general by President Adams on July 3, 1798, and held that rank at the time of his death. In accordance with an act of congress passed a few years ago the rank of lieutenant general becomes abolished with the retirement of General MacArthur.

Like his immediate predecessor in rank, General Henry C. Corbin, General MacArthur began his military career in the volunteer army which was created for service in the Civil War. Arthur MacArthur was born in Massachusetts, June 2, 1845. He was still an infant when his parents went to Wisconsin and settled in Milwaukee. His father was the late Judge Arthur MacArthur, who had also served as lieutenant governor of Wisconsin and for five days as governor. Young MacArthur received his education at the public schools of Milwaukee and was not quite sixteen when President Lincoln issued his first call for volunteers. So great was his eagerness to become a soldier that his father had great difficulty in inducing him to wait until he was stronger and better prepared for the hardships of campaign life.

The boy lost none of his eagerness and spent nearly all his time in the recruiting camps, watching the drills and studying tactics. In August, 1862, the governor, who had kept his eye on the boy, commissioned him first lieutenant and adjutant of the Twenty-fourth Wisconsin regiment. When young MacArthur, then a delicate boy, slim and with his voice not yet fully changed, reported to the colonel of the regiment, he received scant welcome. The colonel appealed to the governor for a more mature adjutant, but the governor declined the request. MacArthur proved a model adjutant, however, and soon distinguished himself by his coolness under fire and his bravery. His first battle was Perryville, and no officer of the com-

battle of Stone River. He was no less distinguished at the great battle of Chickamauga and at Missionary Ridge, November 25, 1863. During the storming of the earthworks on the ridge Lieut. MacArthur took the flag of his regiment from the color bearer who had fallen and led the command in the charge, being the first to scale the ridge and planting his flag there. For this act he was awarded a medal of honor by congress.

He was promoted major on January 25, 1864, acted as lieutenant colonel during Sherman's march to Atlanta, and was slightly wounded in that campaign. He was breveted colonel on March 13, 1865, promoted to lieutenant colonel of the Twenty-fourth Wisconsin infantry, May 18, 1865, and honorably mustered out June 10, 1865. He was not yet entitled to vote when he brought back his regiment to Wisconsin after the close of the war. After a few months of rest at home young MacArthur applied for a commission in the regular army, and was made second and first lieutenant on the same day, February 23, 1866. In July of the same year he was made a captain, which rank he retained for twenty-three years.

On May 26, 1899, Captain MacArthur was transferred to the adjutant general's department with the rank of major and not until 1896 was he promoted to lieutenant colonel. This rank he held at the beginning of the Spanish-American war, when he was

made a brigadier general of volunteers, reaching Manila in time to participate in the battle of August 13. On the same day he was made major general, was made commander of the troops in the Philippines and governor general, succeeding Genral Otis in 1900. He was relieved in July, 1901, and returned to the United States.

On January 2, 1900, his rank in the regular army was changed from lieutenant colonel to brigadier general, over the heads of all colonels in the army and many lieutenant colonels whose commissions antedated his. On February 5, 1901, he was made major general and placed in command of the Department of the Lakes. At different times he also commanded the Department of the East, the Department of California and finally the Division of the Pacific. He became lieutenant general September 15, 1906. He was with the Japanese army during the war between Russia and Japan and afterward traveled extensively in the Far East and in India.

Natchez, Miss., May 31.—Cyclonic winds and torrential rains from midnight to 3:30 a. m. in Natchez and vicinity unroofed the Natchez Compress company's mammoth plant, disarranged the electric light, telephone and telegraph service, snapped live oak trees at the trunk and worked great damage to gardens. The loss in the city will reach \$3,000.
