HANDS GAYNOR A HOT ONE.
Hearst, the New York Publisher, Continues Fight on the Mayor.

New York, May 1.—Wm. R. Hearst continued his war on Mayor Gaynor today by publishing in the New York American a cable message from former Mayor McClellan, in which McClellan places at Gaynor's door the responsibility for the payment of \$48,000 to Daniel F. Cohalan, the Tammany leader. It was the payment of the money and Hearst's comments thereon that caused Mayor Gaynor's attack on Hearst at the dinner of the newspaper publishers at the Waldorf-Astoria.

McClellan's cable follows: "Florence, Italy, April 30, 1910. To the Editor of the New York American: In the last days of my administration Chamberlain Martin called my attention to the \$48,000 warrant for Cohalan. As the amount seemed excessive for the work alleged to have been performed, I directed Martin to secure the warrant in the finance department and return it to me. In the rush of leaving office I had no time to investigate and directed the chief clerk in the mayor's office to hold up the warrant and call my successor's attention to it immediately after January 1. I am confident the chief clerk obeyed. The amount may have been justified, but I did not authorize its payment. (Signed): Geo. B. McClellan."

London, May 3.—A mighty throng of visitors journeyed to Shepherd's Bush today for the inauguration of the great Japan-British exhibition. Though much remains to be done in the way of putting on the finishing touches it was apparent to all who attended the opening that the exhibition is destined to eclipse in many respects all of the similar international shows held in London during the last few years. The display comprises a wealth of magnificent exhibits illustrating the manners and customs, arts and industries of the Japanese. Models and other exhibits show the progress of the kingdom in agriculture, manufacturing and commerce. There are also typical Japanese tea gardens, bazaars and theatres for the entertainment of the visitors. The deep interest which the British public has of late years manifested in Japan and the Japanese is sufficient to insure the success of the exhibition, which will continue through the summer.
