

BRANAGAN BURNED OUT

QUICK BURNING FIRE GUTTED THE STORE OF WM. BRANAGAN CO. EARLY SUNDAY MORNING. FIREMEN DID GREAT WORK.

Sunday morning between 2:30 and 3 o'clock, fire was discovered burning in the Wm. Branagan Co. gentlemen's furnishing store, on Spring street, and despite the fact that the fire company responded promptly to the alarm and that a good water pressure was available, the interior of the store was badly damaged and the entire stock heavily damaged. The fire evidently spread with great rapidity, as the night officers say they had inspected things there just a few minutes before the fire was discovered and that it was well. No one seems to know anything about the origin of the fire. The fire company succeeded in keeping the fire in the one building, and the people next door were not damaged in any way. The Lindell Hotel, just west of the burned building, and across a narrow alley, and many of the east rooms of the hotel were filled with smoke, causing much apprehension among the guests, most of whom dressed and came down under the impression that the hotel was on fire. But no damage was sustained there.

Mr. Branagan estimates that his stock invoices about \$9,000.00, and was insured with the J. W. Ozment agency for \$5,000.00. Most of the stock is damaged either by fire or by water and smoke.

The building, a two-story brick, is owned by Mayor A. L. Bowers, and is insured in the Ozment agency for \$9,000. The insurance will cover the damage to the building, it is believed. The Order of Eagles occupied the second floor of the building as a lodge and the damage there is estimated at possibly \$500. The lodge and paraphernalia were insured for \$700 with Kendall & Wilson. The fire company is being complimented again today for its splendid fighting fires.


