

### TEXAS NEWS NOTES.

Judge Amerman of Harris county will seek the passage of a law prohibiting the shipment of vagrants and lunatics from one city to another.

The Railroad Commission grants a \$1.50 rate on iron from East Texas fields to Galveston and Texas City.

The schedule of the state purchasing agent calls for the expenditure of \$1,000,000, or 20 per cent more than last year.

The construction of the new Mexican railway is expected to result in a larger number of boats in the Galveston-Mexican service.

Commissioner Hawkins defended the new fire insurance law at the San Antonio meeting of agents.

Hon. Gordon Russell of Tyler was nominated by President Taft as judge of the United States court for the Eastern District of Texas.

### HIGH SCHOOL NOTES.

When all the business of the club was closed up in good order it was adjourned sine die.

### CANNON FOUND.

at Washington.

Austin, Texas, May 27.—W. C. superintendent of public buildings grounds, has at last discovered second of the historic howitzers, cannon presented to the republic of Texas in provincial days. A letter from General William Crozier, chief of ordinance, conveyed the information that this historic old Texas cannon is now mounted in front of the state and war department building at Washington.

Superintendent Day wrote to Washington in his effort to locate the "Twin Sisters."

The mate to the gun at Washington is now safely reposing in the adjutant general's office. The gun at Washington will be returned to Austin through the efforts of Congressman Burleson and both of the old short, big muzzle-loaders will be mounted in front of the state capitol.

These old cannon were made in 1836 and were presented to the republic of Texas by Major General T. J. Chambers. They bear the inscription "Presented to the Republic of Texas by Major General T. J. Chambers." How this gun ever got to Washington is a mystery.
