### FIRE CAPTAIN WAS KILLED

And Three Firemen Injured in Fire Which Burned the Waters Pierce Company's Storage Plant.

St. Louis, Mo., July 2.—Fire Captain Lyons was killed, a laborer was fatally injured and three firemen were seriously burned in a fire which destroyed the Waters Pierce Oil company's storage and shipping station here this morning. The financial loss will reach a quarter of a million dollars. Fire Captain Lyons was caught under a falling wall. Three giant tanks were destroyed and nineteen terrific explosions occurred.

## NEWS OF NEXT WEEK

"NOISELESS FOURTH" WILL BE SLOGAN IN LARGE SECTION OF COUNTRY — SPEAKER CANNON WILL TALK IN OHIO.

### (Herald Special.)

Washington, D. C., July 2.—For the first time in history, a "Noiseless Fourth" will be the slogan of the Independence Day celebrations throughout a large section of the country on Monday. The movement to eliminate dangerous explosives which in the past has resulted in so many fatalities has gained a strong foothold, especially in the large cities, where old-fashioned amusements and historical exercises will be indulged in. In accordance with custom the day will be marked by innumerable sporting and athletic contests of every variety. Foremost among the events of this nature, so far as the attention of the public is concerned, will be the fight at Reno between James J. Jeffries and Jack Johnson for the world's pugilistic championship.

President Taft, according to his present program, will put in the busiest Fourth he has ever experienced. Leaving his summer home in Beverly at an early hour Monday he will motor to Revere Beach and Somerville and later into Boston, reviewing "safe and sane Fourth of July parades" in each place. After taking luncheon with President Lowell of Harvard University he will go to the Stadium to deliver the opening address at the annual convention of the National Educational Association.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Canadian premier, accompanied by other leaders of the Liberal party, will depart from Ottawa on an extensive political speech-making tour of the west. The trip will occupy two months and will extend westward to the Pacific.

The notable wedding of the week will be that of Miss Anna Cockrell, daughter of ex-Senator Cockrell of Missouri, and L. A. Coromilas, the minister from Greece to the United States. The wedding will take place at Norwich, Conn.

Speaker Cannon of the house of representatives is scheduled to open the congressional campaign in Ohio

with an address at the Urbana chautauqua assembly Thursday.

Other events that will furnish news of the week will include the unveiling of statues of Henry Clay in Lexington and Paducah, the annual meeting of the Catholic Educational Association in Detroit, opening of the Elks' national convention in the same city, the assembling of the Pan-American conference in Buenos Ayres, the proceedings of the International Railway Congress in Berne, an international congress of the Swedenborg church in London, and the Royal Henley regatta in which Canadian oarsmen will test for honors against the best of England and the continent.

### TEXAS NEWS NOTES

E. H. Terrell, former minister in Belgium and retired capitalist, died at San Antonio last night.

Mark Wiess, a prominent citizen of Beaumont, died last night.

A storm resulted in damage to many buildings in Coleman county. One death is reported.

Several insurance companies have notified the fire rating board of their willingness to accept the new ruling.

C. H. Russell, engineer, was killed and Alfred Wenwhen, oiler, was seriously injured, in an accident to the engine at the San Marcos light plant.

The board of education invests \$67,500 in Texas school lands. The department of state receipts for June totaled \$132,839, the largest in history for that month.

The state of Texas will bring suit in the United States supreme court for possession of Sabine river island lands.

Governor Campbell will call a special election to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Representative C. C. Pierce of Laredo.

F. H. Scott, charged with killing Robt. McArtor in Houston, was allowed bail in the sum of \$10,000.

The Houston Heights murder mystery is being investigated by the Harris county grand jury.
