SWALLOWS RAILROADS UP KOREA NEED CASH

JAPAN TAKES OVER THE KINGDOM OF KOREA, AFTER HISTORY OF MORE THAN SIX HUNDRED YEARS.

Tokio, Japan, Aug. 29.—After more than six hundred years of existence the Korean kingdom was today swallowed up by Japan, in the treaty of annexation, formally promulgated. By the terms, agreed to a few days ago, Japan's area is increased by 82,000 square miles, and its population is increased by 30,000,000. Seoul dispatches say the annexation has caused no disturbances.

SO SAY THEIR TRAFFIC AND OTHER OFFICIALS, BUT SHIPPERS RESIST THE ADVANCE IN FREIGHT RATES.

Chicago, Aug. 29.—One of the most important commercial battles in the history of the United States was inaugurated today with the arrival of the members of the Interstate Commerce Commission to begin their inquiry into the proposed advance in freight rates recently announced by the roads of the Western Trunk Line Association. The roads involved number over two hundred and include virtually all of the important transportation lines in the western trunk line, trans-Missouri and Illinois freight committee territories. It will probably be several months before the taking of testimony is completed. The traffic and other officials of the railroads will endeavor to convince the commission that the roads are in need of a general and marked advance in freight rates. Opposing them will be a large number of prominent shippers and shippers' organizations, who will contend that the increase demanded is entirely unwarranted by existing conditions.

GUNS BOOM MEN WHOOP

WHEN TEDDY ARRIVED IN DENVER TODAY—BIGGEST DEMONSTRATION OF THE TRIP ACROSS THE COUNTRY.

Denver, Colo., Aug. 29.—What Cheyenne left undone for Roosevelt Saturday in the way of strenuousness was supplied by Denver today, when the colonel arrived at 10:40 for a twenty-four hours' stay. He was greeted by the largest crowd since the beginning of the trip. A hundred thousand visitors and a salute of twenty-one guns announced Roosevelt's arrival. He was received by a committee composed of Governor Shafroth, Mayor Speer, and representatives of state and civil organizations.

BIG WOMAN BANDIT BUSY

is Being Sought By Officers in St. Tammany Parish, Louisiana. She Uses a Gun.

New Orleans, La., Aug. 29.—Posses are today searching for a woman bandit who is six feet and three inches tall, and who has been holding up planters and others in great numbers in St. Tammany parish, in the vicinity of the health resorts there. The bandit is believed to be George Wren, who once served a term in the penitentiary and is notorious throughout the southwest. The woman springs from her hiding place along the roads and levels a gun at her victim and demands his valuables. Saturday she horsewhipped a rich planter because he carried only fifteen cents in his pockets, and warned him to carry more money with him in the future.

INSURGENTS CONTROL

But It is Predicted a Conservative, Progressive Platform Will Be Adopted in Kansas.

Topeka, Kas., Aug. 29.—The insurgents will control the Kansas state republican council here tomorrow, but despite a majority for the insurgents it is predicted today that a conservative, progressive platform regarding national issues will be adopted. It is believed the conservative wing of the party will prevent denouncement of the Taft administration, even should the radicals attempt it. It is regarded probable, however, that the administration will be endorsed for its "good intentions" at least. Democrats, socialists and prohibitionists will also be assembled here tomorrow, though separately.

CRIPPEN WANTED TO DIE

Writing on Business Card Tells of Mental Anguish of Hunted Man. Remanded to Sept. 6.

London, Aug. 29.—"I can't stand the horror through which I have gone every night any longer, and I have made up my mind to jump overboard tonight." This is part of some writing on one of Dr. H. H. Crippen's business cards found on Crippen when he was arrested, according to the testimony of Inspector Dew in the Bow street police court today, when Crippen and Miss Leneve were formally arraigned for murdering Belle Elmore, actress wife of Dr. Crippen. Continuing Crippen wrote: "I can see nothing ahead of me; my money has run out. I know I have spoiled your life, but I hope some day you will forgive me. My last words are of love. Yours, etc." The prisoners were remanded to jail until September 6, when they will be called upon to plead. The prosecution announced that Miss Leneve will be tried only as an accessory, as she is accused of "assisting, maintaining and harboring."

ABOUT RED HEADED SIREN

Thomas Lawson In Interview Says He Knows the Standard Oil Siren Quite Well.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 29.—The Standard Oil red headed siren, who according to Mrs. Lillian Hobart French of New York, lured Fritz Augustus Heinz to near destruction in the panic of 1907, has accomplished even greater feats according to Thomas W. Lawson of frenzied finance fame, who says he knows the woman quite well. Lawson withholds the name, but in an interview today declared that to the wiles of this woman is due the fact that a certain man is in the United States senate today. He says the woman has been a factor in state, financial, federal and international affairs.
