

WESTERN CHAMPIONSHIP

is at Stake in Football Game Between Minnesota and Michigan at Ann Arbor Saturday.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Nov. 18.—Not since the Chicago-Michigan gridiron battles were discontinued in 1905 has so much interest been taken in a football game in the west, as is manifested in the contest between Minnesota and Michigan on Ferry Field tomorrow, the crucial game in this year's struggle for the western championship. Hundreds of visitors, including big delegations of alumni of both institutions from all over the west, are arriving in town on every train and the indications are that tomorrow's crowd will be the largest that ever witnessed a football game in Ann Arbor.

Minnesota is a slight favorite in the betting, a natural result of the excellent showing made by the Gophers since the beginning of the season. The Minnesota money is finding ready takers, however, giving evidence of the fact that the followers of Michigan have not lost faith in their team and have confidence in its ability to hold its own against the formidable Minnesota eleven.

Yale and Harvard Followers Gather. (Herald Special.)

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 18.—Thousands of followers of the blue and the crimson are gathering here for tomorrow's football game which will award the honors of the year to either Yale or Harvard. Every train from east and west today brought its quota of enthusiasts. Clubs and fraternity houses are keeping open for the visitors, among whom are thousands of classmen and graduates of the two universities. Practically every ticket for the field has been disposed of, and the Yale stands are sure to hold a record-breaking crowd tomorrow. Coaches on both sides were confident today. Harvard is a favorite in the wagers, some bets at odds of nearly two to one being offered on her chances.

TO MEET IN SAN ANTONIO

Hundreds of Visitors Will Attend the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress Next Week.

San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 18.—All arrangements are practically completed for the meeting of the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress, which is expected to attract hundreds of visitors to San Antonio next week. The local committee is in receipt of advices indicating that the attendance will be larger and of a more representative character than at any of the previous meetings of the organization.

Public men and industrial leaders from many states will address the congress during the three days' session. Included among the scheduled speakers are William J. Bryan of Nebraska, Gifford Pinchot, former chief forester of the United States; John M. Parker of New Orleans, president of the Southern Commercial Congress; United States Senator

Stone of Missouri and United States Senator Bailey of Texas. The governors of Colorado, Nebraska, Oklahoma and several other states have also signified their intention to attend the gathering.

WANTS CITY ORDINANCE

To Prohibit Indiscriminate Distribution of Patent Medicines, Etc.

Editors Palestine Herald:

As a reader of the Herald, and a citizen of Palestine, I ask space in your paper to protest against an evil that I regard as a most dangerous practice. I refer to the practice of the miscellaneous distribution of samples of all kinds of medicine for advertising purposes. These samples of patent nostrums are thrown inside the yards of the people of the city, where they can be picked up by little children and probably eaten by them. There are thousands of cases in the medical records, and newspapers, too, for that matter, where babies and small children have found these poisonous samples and eaten them, causing death. Such scattering of this sort of stuff should be prohibited by a city ordinance, and I hope that you will find space in your editorials to condemn such practice and advocate the passage of such a law.

Another thing in this connection is the distribution of vile and obscene booklets, circulars, etc., under the guise of medical literature. This is frequently done in Palestine, and it should be stopped. Along the same line I would favor the prohibition of distributing all circulars, cards and dodgers in the residence district. As it is now, it keeps one busy picking up such trash off the yards and clearing up the litter made by this sort of advertising that is not read by one person in fifty.

Virginia Baptists In Session.


