

MONUMENT UNVEILED

People of Georgia Honor the Memory of General Oglethorpe, Founder of Colony of Georgia.

Savannah, Ga., Nov. 23.—Amid the enthusiastic demonstrations of a great concourse of people, the handsome monument erected in memory of General James Edward Oglethorpe, the founder of the colony of Georgia, was unveiled today. The ceremony of unveiling occurred in Chippewa Square, where the memorial to the celebrated English soldier and colonizer has been erected. Surrounding the monument were great stands to accommodate the many officials and guests invited to take part in the exercises. Included among the latter were several prominent members of the British embassy at Washington and official representatives of the states of Georgia, Florida and South Carolina.

The exercises were preceded by a brilliant military pageant. In the procession were sailors from the cruiser Birmingham, two battalions of the Seventeenth Infantry from Fort McPherson, a squadron of the Eleventh cavalry from Fort Oglethorpe, three companies of coast artillery from Fort Screven and several regiments of the National Guard of Georgia.

The monument consists of an imposing pile of marble surmounted by a bronze statue of General Oglethorpe designed by Daniel French. The entire cost of the memorial was in the neighborhood of \$40,000, which was subscribed by the state of Georgia, the city of Savannah and several patriotic societies.

General James Oglethorpe, in honor of whose memory the monument has been erected, came to America in 1733 to found a colony of protestants, with a special view to providing for young men just starting in life and with no influence or property. With thirty-five families he landed in South Carolina, where he left the colonists while he explored the country between Carolina and Florida. This section was claimed by both England and Spain, but Oglethorpe made a purchase from the Creek Indians, from that portion that is now Georgia, and founded the colony and a town that is now the city of Savannah. It was George II who granted the patent for founding the colony and it was named for him.

Aside from his career in America the life of Oglethorpe was full of picturesque incidents. Born in the reign of William III in 1695, he knew many of the famous men of the next century intimately. He began his service as a soldier under Marlborough, and was an aide of Prince Eugene in his war against the Turks. He sat many years in parliament and was distinguished in society and as a friend of letters. He lived long enough to see the success of his American colony, his death occurring at his home in England in 1785.


