Cattle Notes. Reports from Eddy county are that both range and cattle are in good condition.

The Daily-Chandler concentrator is running night and day on Brush Heap ore successfully, saving 70 per cent of the bullion.

The Sierra county democrats nominated the following ticket at Hermosa last Saturday. For Representative, W. S. Hopewell; sheriff, S. W. Sanders; clerk, G. W. Holt; assessor, J. P. Parker; treasurer, C. C. Miller; superintendent public schools, Geo. E. Robin; county commissioners, Gus Reingart, D. Montoya, Edward Fest; probate judge, Jose Tafuya; coroner, Geo. W. McAfee.

Judge McFie performed his first marriage ceremony since assuming his office at Las Cruces. The high contracting parties were Librado Buehovsky and Mary Wood, daughter of David Wood, of that city.

The scaffold on which Harry Pelton and Albert Ely were working while painting the new school building at San Marcial, broke, and both were thrown to the ground, a distance of about fifteen feet.

T. Bonault is very busy with his canning establishment in the rear of his store at Las Cruces. He will put up 30,000 cans of tomatoes, and as many peaches.

Deming has recently taken on something of a side-walk boom. A walk has been laid on Gold Avenue from Kidder's corner to the railroad track, and a walk has also been laid on Pine street, between Iron and Zinc streets.

J. K. Livingston, of Las Cruces, has received a letter from Dr. F. Seward, of Goshen, N. Y., stating that he had just closed with Senator Dorsey for the purchase of his magnificent ranch property in Colfax county and would remove his Sanitarium to New Mexico at once.

A scientific society has been organized in Las Cruces under the name of the "New Mexico Society for the advancement of Science." There are so far about 15 members. The society will meet on the first Tuesday in each month, when a program of papers will be read and discussed.

There was a meeting of the board of regents of the Agricultural College on Monday. Only a quorum was present, Regents Black and Raymond being absent. The only business of importance out of the ordinary routine was a provision for the establishment of a foundry and blacksmith shop.

The Mesquero Indians. On the 27th ult. Col. Richard Hudson had his first struggle for supremacy over the government wards under his charge at the Mesquero Agency, and, as all his friends knew he would, showed himself master of the situation.

Asa and Chas. Jones, accused of cattle stealing were tried at Springer last week, and acquitted.

J. A. Johnson, of Albuquerque, will ship in a few days several thousand head of cattle to La Janta, Col., for pasture.

Daggs Bros., of Flagstaff, will commence shipping a large number of feeding sheep to Chillicothe, Ill., some time this week.

A correspondent of the Wilcox Stockman from Crittendon, Ariz., speaking of the drought in South Arizona says: "From present appearances 20 per cent of all the cattle in southern Pima county, are now dead. They died during the past winter and early spring. The rains of January and February, 1892, depleted the herds as though they had been showers of poison. No man today throughout all this section has within half the cattle that he had this time last year. There has been some fall of water over this section, but the area was limited over which it fell, and the time between each fall was so long that the effect of one rain was entirely lost before another came.

A correspondent of the Orange Judd Farmer says: At present the outlook of the cattle industry is more encouraging than for years. The markets during the past three months have improved and the quality of the store stock is frequently much better.

The hydraulic tunnel of the Niagara Falls Power Company will undoubtedly make the city of Niagara Falls, N. Y., the greatest manufacturing center in the world.

The tunnel is 9,700 feet long, starting from the river just below the water level below the falls, and running under the city of Niagara to the river bank, a mile above the falls. The tunnel is 10 feet wide by 21 feet high inside of the brick work, with which it is lined.

A tunnel, the longest in the world, has been projected and begun, practically, under Simpton to supersede the famous road over the mountain constructed by Napoleon. The "Route of Simpton" is thirty eight miles in length; the tunnel will be a little less than twelve miles and a half.

In the limited area between Worth Street and the Battery, New York, where there are many large wholesale houses, it is stated that fifteen thousand women are employed as typewriters.

The following platform was adopted by the anti-Catron wing of the republican party in 1884. The situation has changed since then: "The committee on platform submitted the subjoined, which was unanimously adopted, and the convention adjourned sine die: "We, the representatives of the republicans of New Mexico, in convention assembled, hereby reaffirm our devotion to the republican party and our adherence to the great principles whose advocacy for the past quarter of a century has made that party the champion of civil and religious liberty, and whose maintenance has contributed so materially to the happiness and prosperity of the nation.

We endorse the platform of the national republican party, adopted by its convention lately held in Chicago, and its candidates for president and vice-president there nominated.

We heartily endorse the administration of Chester Arthur, as wise, prudent and entitled to the approval of all patriotic and conservative citizens.

We tender our gratified thanks to the congress of the United States for the wise and salutary measures inaugurated by it in the cause of popular education in the states and territories, and pledge ourselves to make all efforts required of us to secure the liberal appropriations proposed by congress for that purpose.

We assert that there now exists, and has for a long time existed in this territory, a combination of men who have controlled, and who seek to control public affairs for their own pecuniary and personal advantage; and to the wrongdoers and selfish advancement of their private interests, to the public detriment.

We charge that this combination for the accomplishment of a selfish purpose, and for their personal aggrandizement, has by corrupt methods directed a course of legislation that has resulted in the imposing of an enormous and unnecessary debt upon the people of the territory. As an illustration of what they have done in this connection we refer to the acts known as the capital and penitentiary bills, the passage of which by the late legislative assembly of this territory, was procured by the most reprehensible methods.

In the name of the republican party of New Mexico, we denounce and repudiate these acts and the methods resorted to to secure their passage; and we pledge ourselves to do all in our power to relieve the people of the territory of the incubus of this corrupt combination, and of the indebtedness created by their wrongful agency.

We assert the management of public affairs in this territory has been of such a character as to demand an investigation by congress. We charge that in numerous instances Spanish and Mexican grants of small bodies of land for pastoral and agricultural purposes have been fraudulently extended and distorted over enormous bodies of the public domain not included in the original grants and over mineral and other rights not included or intended to be included therein.

We find the courts of the territory incapacitated to afford us relief from these evils which imperil our mutual prosperity. And we pledge ourselves to do all in our power to obtain an investigation by congress with a view to secure such legislation as will afford the required relief, and also such legislation as will effectually secure the remaining public lands to actual settlers only.

We demand the exposure and punishment of the notorious, flagrant frauds by which large bodies of the most valuable public lands have been stolen from the government and people by color of the
