ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF ABBEY MINING COMPANY.

Notice is hereby given that the Abbey Mining Company has filed its articles of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of New Mexico and the office of the Recorder of Deeds of Socorro County which are in words and figures as follows:

Know all men by these presents, that we, the undersigned persons, being desirous of forming a corporation under and by virtue of the laws of the Territory of New Mexico, do hereby make, sign and acknowledge the following statement in writing, in accordance with the provisions of Section 415 of the Compiled Laws of New Mexico, 1897, as the articles of incorporation of said Company.

1st. The names of the persons who make this statement are: Nelson Weddle, Jr., of West Newton, Pennsylvania; Earl A. Wheeler, of Sharon, Pennsylvania; Joseph N. Knox, of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania; Edward H. Converse, of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania; Robert W. Judkins, of Allegheny, Pennsylvania; John H. Wertenbach, of McKeesport, Pennsylvania; Nathan Hall, of Socorro, New Mexico; Alice M. Hall, of Socorro, New Mexico; and James G. Fitch, of Socorro, New Mexico.

2nd. The name of this Company shall be "Abbey Mining Company."

3rd. The objects for which this Company is formed are to engage in the general business of mining precious and other ores and minerals, including coal and petroleum, and for this purpose to acquire, own, lease and operate mines, mining claims and mining rights; to buy, sell and treat ores and minerals; to acquire, construct, own and operate ore mills, smelters and other works for the treatment of ores and minerals; also railways, cable ways, tramroads, and other necessary ways for the convenient use of the same; to acquire and use water and water rights, and to construct reservoirs, flumes, pipe lines and ditches necessary for said mining operations, and for its smelters, mills and other works, and to do and perform all things necessary or incidental to its business of mining and treating ores and minerals.

4th. The amount of the capital stock of this Company shall be one million dollars (\$1,000,000) divided into one million shares, of the par value of one dollar each.
