## NEWS OF THE WEEK.

A Summary of Important Events Condensed from the Press Dispatches.

Prince Henry sailed from New York for home Tuesday afternoon.

Miss Alice Roosevelt, daughter of the president, is visiting the island of Cuba.

Ex-Governor John P. Altgeld of Illinois died in Joliet Wednesday morning of apoplexy.

Omaha experienced a severe windstorm Tuesday morning that wrecked about fifty houses.

Morgan O. Llewellyn relieved Quincy Vance as surveyor general of New Mexico Tuesday.

There are rumors of the prevalence of diphtheria in several of the northern towns of the territory.

Senator Clark of Montana wants to be chairman of the Democratic congressional campaign committee.

The measure providing statehood for New Mexico, Arizona, and Oklahoma was reported to the house yesterday.

Secretary Long of the navy department has resigned and W. H. Moody of Massachusetts has been appointed his successor.

General Methuen of the British army, who was severely wounded and captured by the Boers Monday, has been released.

There are 20,000 men idle in Boston because of a strike among railroad freight handlers to prevent the employment of non-union men.

A woman of Raton brought about the capture of two burglars whom she found in her house on her return from church Sunday evening.

The transport Sheridan arrived in San Francisco Thursday from Manila bringing ninety-seven sick, six insane, and 1,189 short term men.

Governor Otero has written a strong letter urging the enforcement in every county in the territory of the law against the selling of liquor on Sunday.

The question of reducing the duty on Cuban sugar is still being debated in Congress. It is understood that the bill for such reduction is to be made an administration measure.

Superintendent I. B. Hanna has been instructed by the interior department not to give grazing permits upon forest reservations in the territory to persons living outside the territory.

Monday's dispatches announced that the British forces had just suffered a severe loss at the hands of the Boers. The British general, Methuen, was wounded and captured, 113 of his men were killed and wounded, and 200 were missing.

Col. Max Frost, editor of the Santa Fe New Mexican, is now a 33d degree Mason, that degree of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite having been conferred upon him this week as a reward for 16 years of efficient service as deputy of the supreme council in New Mexico.

## COMPANY H, 1ST REGIMENT

A Company of the National Guard Now Organized in Socorro.

Socorro is now the proud possessor of a fully organized military company belonging to the national guard. The company is to be known as Company H, of the First Regiment of Infantry. The officers have received their commissions, which are very handsome. The company is drilling every night and, according to Capt. Matthews, making excellent progress. The equipment will be complete and the very latest, including Krag-Jorgensen rifles. A requisition to this effect has already gone forward to the quartermaster's depot in San Francisco.

### GENERAL ORDERS.

Territory of New Mexico, Office of Adjutant General, Santa Fe, N. M., March 8, 1902. General Orders, No. 6.

1. Whereas at the town of Socorro, in the County of Socorro, 43 men possessing the necessary qualifications have associated themselves together for the purpose of organizing a company of infantry, and have applied to the Governor and Commander-in-Chief through the Adjutant General to be made a part of the National Guard of said Territory: It is therefore ordered that said company be and the same is declared organized to be known as Company H, of the First Regiment of Infantry, National Guard of New Mexico, and is assigned to the second battalion.

2. T. J. Matthews is hereby appointed captain; S. Abeyta, first lieutenant, and William M. Swisher, second lieutenant of Company H, First Regiment of Infantry, National Guard, to date from March 8th, 1902, and they will be respected and obeyed accordingly.
