REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

The Winning Ticket Is Nominated
and Great Enthusiasm Prevails.

A FAIR FIELD AND NO FAVORS.

Every Man Nominated Can Be Relied
upon to Do His Full Duty for the
Ticket's Success and His Own.

The Republican county convention for the nomination of a county ticket and the election of delegates to the territorial convention at Raton was called to order at the court house in this city Thursday morning by Estevan Baca, chairman of the central committee. Temporary organization was effected by the election of M. Cooney as chairman and H. H. Howard secretary. On assuming the chair Mr. Cooney addressed the convention in eloquent and impressive words, after which the business of the convention was entered upon by the appointment of the following committees, viz:

The report of the committee on resolutions was then received and adopted as follows:

RESOLUTIONS.

To the chairman and members of the convention:

Your committee on resolutions beg leave to submit the following report and recommend for adoption the following:

We, the Republicans of Socorro county, New Mexico, in delegate convention assembled at the City of Socorro, this 2nd day of October, A. D. 1902, pledge ourselves anew to the great fundamental principles of the Republican party, that, with wise administration, have brought to America unexampled prosperity and excited the admiration and wonder of the civilized world, the Democratic party of the United States only excepted.

We endorse the eminently successful and statesmanlike administrations of William McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt, and point with pride to the wise things they have done and the unwise things they have left undone.

As to the two comparatively new problems of trusts and labor vs. capital, we stand with our two great leaders, Roosevelt and Hanna.

We commend the faithful, honest and persistent efforts in behalf of the people of New Mexico of our eloquent and suave Delegate in Congress, the Hon. B. S. Rodey, and instruct the territorial delegates to be chosen by this convention to vote for his re-nomination.

We commend the good work of our last member of the territorial council from this district, Hon. C. G. Cruickshank, who, as chairman of the committee on finance, was a watch dog of the territorial treasury and was proof as well against improper blemishments as against threats of political annihilation.

We commend the faithful and efficient services of the Republican officials of this county.

We pledge our nominees for members of the legislature, in the event of election, to work and vote for a territorial statute requiring all classes of property to be assessed for taxation in the county where the same is located, regardless of the owner's residence.

We further pledge said nominees to vote and work for a division of this judicial district into at least two district attorney districts, to the end that the business of the territory and county may be more promptly and efficiently dispatched.

We again appeal to the congress of the United States for permission to change the name of the commonwealth in which we live to that of the "State of New Mexico," and pledge our earnest efforts in helping to bring about a consummation so devoutly to be wished.

On motion delegates to represent Socorro county at the territorial convention which meets at Raton October 13 to nominate a candidate for delegate in congress were elected as follows:

TERRITORIAL DELEGATES.

Camilo Baca, J. M. Allen, Abran Abeyta, S. Alexander, C. G. Cruickshank, Ricardo Abeyta, L. R. Babcock, M. Cooney, John E. Griffith.

A motion was made that a committee of five be appointed to confer with a like committee from the Democratic convention with reference to the nomination of candidates for county offices. The motion prevailed and the committee was appointed as follows:

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE.

C. G. Cruickshank, Abran Abeyta, Pablo Trujillo, Gabriel Mora, Camilo Baca.

Adjournment was then taken to give this committee time to prepare their report. The convention did not reassemble for active proceedings until yesterday morning, when it was reported that a union ticket was impossible. The business of nominating a straight Republican ticket was then undertaken with enthusiasm. The nomination of each candidate was greeted with rounds of applause that portended victory in the present campaign, no matter how hard fought it may be.

At the conclusion of the business of forming a ticket Hon. S. Alexander submitted the following resolution: Be it resolved by this convention that Hon. Abran Abeyta be and is hereby selected as chairman of the Republican county central committee for two years with authority to name precinct chairmen for the several precincts of the county and select an executive committee to aid in the conduct of the campaign to victory. The resolution was adopted without a dissenting vote. M. Cooney was then chosen secretary of the central committee, a position which he accepted with an emphatic promise that the business of thoroughly organizing the Republican party of Socorro county would at once be entered upon.

Hon. Frank A. Hubbell, chairman of the territorial central committee, was called upon and in response addressed the convention for a few minutes in eloquent and forceful language concerning the grand purposes and achievements of the great Republican party. The address

was frequently interrupted by loud and enthusiastic applause. At its conclusion the convention adjourned sine die.

Such were the proceedings of one of the most notable Republican conventions ever held in Socorro county. There was a desperate struggle between two opposing factions for control of the convention both before and after it assembled. The losing faction went over to the Democratic convention and openly pledged their support to the Democratic ticket. Abran Abeyta demonstrated his skill as a political manager and if he secures the election of the Republican ticket he will be in absolute control of the county for years to come. This is but the result of the operation of the principle of the survival of the fittest.

INDEPENDENT REPUBLICANS.

The Third Ticket Reaffirms Republican Principles, Nominates Rodey and Endorses the Democratic County Ticket.

A considerable number of Socorro county Republicans who are dissatisfied with certain conditions that they declare prevailed in the regular county convention assembled in the city yesterday afternoon and went through the formality of holding a convention. The Chieftain had no representative present but it is reported that the participants were such men as Estevan Baca, Candelario Garcia, Jose E. Torres, A. A. Sedillo, Elfege Baca, A. C. Abeyta, Ed Stapleton, and other Republicans of no less influence and following in the county.

This convention declared its allegiance to Republican principles as enunciated by the last national convention, nominated Hon. B. S. Rodey for delegate to Congress and Hon. W. H. Andrews for councilman from this district, and endorsed the Democratic candidates for the county offices. The promoters of this movement are such Republicans as are opposed to what they are pleased to consider "one man rule" in the county organization. The ticket and full proceedings of the convention will appear in The Chieftain next week.
