**DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.**

Unterrified and Enthusiastic Democrats of Socorro County Name a Ticket That Greatly Pleases Them.

**FUSION PROPOSAL IS REJECTED.**

Leaders Delude Themselves That They Have a Better Prospect of Winning Than Ever Before.

The Democratic county convention assembled in the Garcia opera house Thursday morning and was called to order by John Greenwald, chairman of the county committee. Secretary Benj. Sanchez read the call. As temporary officers Meliton Torres and Liberato Pino were chosen chairman and secretary respectively. A. C. Torres and Benj. Sanchez were chosen interpreters.

**PERMANENT ORGANIZATION.**

The committee on permanent organization reported a resolution that Jas. G. Fitch be made permanent chairman, Meliton Gonzales secretary, and A. C. Torres interpreter. The resolution was adopted.

The convention then adjourned and a secret caucus was held to consider the proposition of uniting with the Republicans on a single ticket. It is understood that this question gave rise to a long and animated discussion which finally resulted in the rejection of the overtures of the Republican committee and the nomination of a straight ticket. The convention did not reassemble until yesterday morning, when the above ticket was nominated.

The report of the committee on resolutions was adopted as follows:

**RESOLUTIONS.**

We reaffirm our allegiance to the principles of the Democratic party as announced by the Democratic National Convention held at Kansas City.

We hereby pledge our hearty, sincere and unanimous support to the candidate for Delegate to Congress to be nominated by the Democratic Territorial Convention at Albuquerque on the 13th day of October, A. D. 1902. We denounce the dominant faction of the Republican party in this County for its corrupt methods in the selection of its candidates and its open attempts to elect them, not on their merits, but by lavish use of money, and its manifest contempt of the rights and interests of the people.

We further denounce them for attempting to create and perpetuate "one man power" in Socorro county, and to retain persons in office who have been shown to be totally unfit to discharge the public trusts. We believe that this condition should be changed and to that end we invite all persons, without regard to their former party affiliations, to unite with us and purify the present conditions.

Adjournment was then taken sine die.

Thus ended one of the most laborious Democratic conventions ever held in Socorro county. Those who took part in the work profess to be very much pleased with the result, deluding themselves with the belief that they will win this time sure. They base their belief on the fancied strength of their ticket and the allegiance of bolting Republicans who came into their convention and openly pledged their support to the ticket nominated.

The celebration of the festival of San Miguel attracted the usually large crowd to the city. Special services were conducted at the church, after which a long procession marched around the plaza and returned. The ball given in the opera house at night by San Miguel band was largely attended and was a decided success in every particular.
