RICH STRIKE IN COONEY CONFIRMED

Mogollon Gold and Copper Company Strikes Rich Gold-Silver Vein.

G. W. Stubbs of the Mogollon Gold and Copper company yesterday received from Cooney full confirmation of the report of an important strike in the company's mines at that place. A body of ore has been encountered and is now being opened which gives returns of \$4,500 in gold and silver to the ton and carrying 20 per cent copper, says the Albuquerque Journal.

This is as good or better than the best ores taken from the famous Cooney mine, the property of the Mogollon company, which has produced almost two million dollars and is the most important discovery of the Mogollon company since it began operations in that district.

In the southern portion of the district a vein of gold-silver ore has been opened which assays 30 ounces in gold and 14,000 ounces in silver to the ton. The pay streak is eight inches wide. Many prospectors are flocking into the district, principally from Arizona and the entire country around is being located.

ROSEDALE MINE SOLD

After Oft Repeated Rumors of Sale This Valuable Property at Last Changes Hands

L. R. BABCOCK IS THE PROMOTER

A Strong Indiana Company Is the Purchaser at a Price Probably Near \$150,000

During the last few years there have been repeated rumors that the famous Rosedale mine had been sold or that a sale of the property was pending. All rumors of sale proved, however, to be false.

It can now be stated positively that the sale has been made.

About eight months ago L. R. Babcock of Kelly, who was connected with the recent sale of the famous Kelly mine, secured an option on the Rosedale mine. Mr. Babcock set about finding purchasers for the property and finally succeeded in interesting certain Indiana capitalists.

A sale was made to these gentlemen only a few days ago. A company was organized and will take possession of the property about the first of next month.

The Rosedale mine has for several years been known to be one of the most desirable mining properties in this section. It has been worked for gold, and the ore of that metal taken from the mine has at times been of almost fabulous richness. In these workings a depth of about 750 feet has been reached and not less than 6,000 feet of development work has been done. It is an open secret that the mine has paid for all this development work and a generous dividend besides.

Mr. Babcock, who was in Socorro Tuesday, informed a representative of the Chieftain that the new company would at once set about operating the Rosedale mine on a larger and more elaborate scale. While he declined to state the purchase price of the mine, some who are in a position to form a reasonable estimate think the price not far from \$150,000.

AFFLICTED WITH SCREW WORMS

Nepomuceno Chavez of Polvadera Is Relieved of Sixty-five of the Dangerous Pests.

Nepomuceno Chavez of Polvadera is the latest victim of the screw worm in this vicinity. On Wednesday of last week Chavez took a nap in an open room at his home and on awakening had to blow a small fly out of his nose. On Saturday he came to Socorro and applied to Doctor Blackington for relief from severe pains in his nose and head. The Doctor injected a remedy into the sick man's nose and in a short time no less than fifty screw worms were ejected. Injections of the remedy on the same day and on the following day were followed by the ejection of more worms until the total number reached sixty-five. On Monday morning Chavez returned home apparently a cured and certainly a wiser man. Hereafter when he takes his siesta in the open air he will doubtless see to it that his nasal appendage is carefully screened against the screw worm fly.

HELLO MAGDALENA.

After many unavoidable delays telephonic connection has at last been established between Socorro and Magdalena.
