Is In No Hurry.

Uncle Sam is Not Bound to Quit Pekin Until He is Ready.

LI IS OFF FOR PEKIN

Prince Tuan it seems is the Main Obstacle to Making Peace.— Li Hong Chang Going to Pekin.

Shanghai, Sept. 14.—Li Hong Chang has started north. It is rumored that the governments intend to seize the canal at several points in order to protect their interests in Shen Tung.

Washington, Sept. 14.—There was no developments in the Chinese negotiations today with which the public could be made acquainted, the whole matter being still in diplomatic phase and therefore not calling for military orders. The situation has lost something of its acuteness, owing to the change in the attitude of Russian government as indicated in yesterday's dispatches. No official confirmation has reached here of the postment of the withdrawal but the fact is not doubted here. There is nothing in the American note to Russia that demands an immediate evacuation by American troops in the event that the Russian troops are called away. Instead, it is stated that the control of the situation would simply pass from the state department into the hands of General Chaffee, and it will be for him to determine the time and how they will evacuate Pekin.

A UNION BRIDGE.

Railroads will Combine on a Temporary Plan at Galveston.

PLANS FOR FUTURE.

Later They Will Unite and Construct a Big Double Track Steel Bridge.

DOING TRAFFIC BY BOAT.

Are Carrying Freight to Texas City by Rail and From There to Galveston by Boat.

Bryan, Tex., Sept. 14.—Vice President and General Manager Trice of the International and Great Northern railroad, spent several hours in the city last night. Mr. Trice had just come from Galveston, where he had been in touch with the situation since the great storm. He said the railroad losses would aggregate five or six million dollars.

"We are now operating trains to Texas City and carrying on traffic from that point to Galveston by boat," said he. "Better shipping facilities will be established at Galveston than ever as fast as men and money can place them there. Negotiations are now going on to the end that all railroads entering the city join forces and materials and establish a temporary bridge across the bay, and if the plan succeeds it is hoped that trains can be run into Galveston in thirty days. The negotiations going on also contemplate the construction of a permanent double track steel bridge to be used by all the railroads entering the city."
