### Prospecting in the West.

Our friend Thomas Goss, Esq., has just returned from a prospecting through the Indian Territory. He stopped at Chickasha, a flourishing, progressive town in the territory, which he says is destined to be one of the great places of that section. It has doubled its population in a year, now claiming about 6,000. The place supports a daily paper, the Chickasha Daily Express, whose motto is, "Chickasha first, the Indian Territory second; the world after." The paper is a good one and is full of advertising, indicating that the town is a live one.

Mr. Goss, we understand, is making preparations to at once go to this thriving western town to permanently locate. His glowing description of the country has aroused a number of others and it would not be surprising if a number of our people did not go out into that country.

The people of Chickasha may be assured, however, that in Mr. Goss they will have a fellow-citizen who will add strength to the place, for he is the kind we regret to lose.—The Tennessean.

### The Island Made Free.

Cuba is the largest of the West India Islands. It lies at the entrance to the Gulf of Mexico, about 130 miles south of Florida. The northern coast is 918 miles long and has 32 harbors. The southern coast is 972 miles long with 12 important harbors. Cuba is 764 miles long and from 74 to 134 miles broad; it has an area of 43,230 square miles. A chain of mountains (highest 8,000 feet) runs through it from east to west. It has more than 200 rivers. The most important is the Canto, which is 150 miles long. As a rule the climate is healthful. The population in 1890 was 1,631,687. It has been estimated that Cuba could support 24,000,000 people. The soil is very rich. Cuba has still 13,000,000 acres of primeval forests. It has valuable iron and copper mines and deposits of manganese. The staple exports are sugar and tobacco. Havana, the capital, has 235,000 inhabitants. The long period of Spanish oppression of this beautiful island ceased forever on January 1, 1899, when it passed under the military control of the United States.
