means gun cotton for Germany, and the destruction of more English Tommies if the Germans lay their hands on it.

Aside from the troublesome aspects of the international situation as it relates to cotton, growers in the past week have noted that the crop condition is not up to what they have hoped for. This may force prices up, but if the crop runs short, even the higher price may not fully recompense the cotton farmer.

Texas is pushing her warehouse campaign strongly feeling that proper places to store the product may have a vital effect on prices. Prospects for 7,000,000 bales warehouse in Dallas are progressing.

In short, Texas, intends to leave nothing undone at home or abroad, as far as in her power lies, to see that the Texas farmer has a better cotton year this season than he did last.

Mingo Defeats Tuttle; Taylor Makes Record

Mingo annexed undisputed honors in the north part of the county yesterday when they defeated Tuttle on Tuttle's home diamond, 5-2. Taylor of Chickasha did the twirling act for the winners against an imported "dark horse," one Cobb, who occupied the mound for Tuttle. Capt. Pete Heffner of the Tyro team in the City League occupied his position at short in the game yesterday, getting four hits in five times up.

In the game yesterday Taylor completed what is declared by local fans to be a record rarely equalled. He struck out ten men of Tuttle's team, raising his total of "K's" to 78 in five straight games, or an average of 15.6 strikeouts to the game. In his pitching this year, on an average he has disposed of five innings each game without the aid of fielders.

The Chickasha twirler pitched for Wynewood against Sulphur Sunday, winning his game, 3-2. He will have the mound position for Fletcher Sunday when that team meets the Soldiers at Ft. Hill.

Ella McClure has filed suit in the district court for a separation from Tecumseh McClure, charging extreme cruelty, gross neglect, habitual drunkenness and failure to lend any support for the wife, though he is alleged to be able bodied and possessed of plenty of means.

The petition states that the two were married at Anadarko on August 12, 1912, and that the plaintiff was forced to leave the defendant for reasons above stated on October 5, 1914. She asks for a division of the property, alimony of \$10 a month and \$50 for attorney's fees and costs of the suit.

Mrs. Yoder is Buried at Blanchard Sunday

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at Blanchard for Mrs. J. D. Yoder, wife of one of the old settlers of the county, who died at her home Saturday. Burial was in the Blanchard cemetery.

Mrs. Yoder was born in Ohio on May 8, 1848. She was married in Ohio to J. D. Yoder, the couple moving to Missouri, where they lived only a few years before coming to the Chickasha country in the Indian Territory. They came here 30 years ago and have lived in the Chickasha and Choctaw country ever since. Seven children have been born to Mr. and Mrs. Yoder, all of whom are still living and all but two of whom were present at the funeral services of the mother.

Mrs. Yoder had been confined to her bed for five years with a lingering illness at the time of her death. She was a strong Christian worker during her lifetime, having been a member of the Christian church for 30 years. Friends of years mourn the loss of Mrs. Yoder and sympathize with her family.
