BARBERS WIN FIRST BALL GAME

Defeat Rock Island 8 to 5 at University Park Yesterday; Both Line-Ups Shifted; Play Typos Sunday

Possibly Capt. Montgomery was just trying the Stallings game. Possibly he has had his men out all season to find out just what the other teams have, but under orders under no circumstances to show any of the tactics worked out for the Barbers, but to solve every trick presented by the opposition. Possibly after losing five straight games, they will win five straight ones, or even beat that.

Anyway, the Barbers broke into the percentage column at University park yesterday, and the Rock Island are the losers therefrom. They dropped the game to a shifted line-up of Hair Cutters, 8-5, the game being called at the end of the eighth inning on account of darkness.

The Barbers showed strong in the third inning, when they started scoring by shanking up four runs. Turner, pitching for the winners, were to first on an error, Reagan and Gullhur followed him, then errors on short and center field let the last of the four men in. Turner, Reagan, Gullhur and Jacobs scoring.

Not to be outclassed, however, the Rock Island, with a line-up badly broken, scored E. Tyrrell, Hehn, F. Tyrrell and Pollard. The tie lasted until the fifth, when E. Tyrrell again scored, giving to the Rock Island the odds of a run, which threatened to win the game. A question at the end of the seventh as to whether the game was for seven innings or nine showed an agreement at the outset to run the full nine innings.

The Barbers won their first game in the City League when Gordon singled. Turner went to first on an error, Reagan flew out but Gullhur held up his reputation to put one across in a tight by laming one out into deep right. Jacobs and Thurlow followed with safeties, scoring Gordon, Turner, Gullhur and Jacobs.

Fans will find out whether or not "Montie" and his Barbers really have struck a winning streak Sunday when they will play the Typos.
