Good Window Cleaner.
A bag filled with powdered pumice stone is an excellent window cleaner. Make the bag of unbleached cotton cloth of a soft quality, not too firm. When finished, the bag is six inches wide and twelve inches long. Into this put about one-eighth of a pound of pumice stone. To prevent soiling this bag, it is slipped into a cheese-cloth case that can be removed and washed. No water is used on the window, but it is rubbed first with a piece of tissue paper, then polished with the bag.

TYPOS GET ONE MORE FROM R. I.

Take 9-8 Contest in Postponed Game; One of Close Contests of Season; Oilers-Barbers Today

Either team deserved to win at University Park yesterday afternoon when the Typos and Rock Island played a postponed game, one of those that was scheduled for the Fourth of July season. The Typos won by a run when Heffner went to second on a long fly in the first of the seventh that Armstrong attempted with one hand, then scored on hits by DeKinder and LaBoone.

The Rock Island rally in the last half of the same inning threatened to boost the contest into extra innings when E. Tyrrell went out, third to first, but Pollard lined a pretty two-bagger out to right, stole second, then came home on two passed balls, while Weir was being walked to first. Weir then stole second, went to third when Heffner, who substituted for Moody in the part of the last half, erred as Estes hit, and Ward, pinch hitter, got a single that left Weir in for the eighth run.

It was only close playing and good luck that permitted Erland and Heffner to get Estes out at home as he slid in on a passed ball, and Ward, after stealing second, was caught attempting third, making the third out.

The game started in favor of the Rock Island, when they held the Typos blank during the first three innings with Weir, Armstrong and F. Lindsay scoring for the Machinists in the second. They kept the odds until the first of the sixth when Heffner got a double, Hall went to first on an error but went out on a fielder's choice when DeKinder knocked one to second base, DeKinder stole second, then LaBoone took first sack when one of Hehn's curves alighted on his jaw. Fox struck out, but with the bases drunk, Erland hit one between short and third and registered two. "Pep" Lindsay then reached first when his younger brother dropped the ball, Rogers doubled and Moody lunched one out in the right field that threatened to be a three-bagger but he over-ran second base and the ball beat him back. Rogers, who was on second base, reached home before Hall made the third man down, so his score was counted, the sixth in the inning.

That little hit-fest gave the Typos a lead of five runs, the score being 5-3. Manager Weir started right off in the last half with a hit to right, then stole second while Estes was striking out, Armstrong went to first on an error by "Pep" Lindsay, Weir scored and Armstrong followed. Hehn hit to right and Riley went to first when the catcher interfered as Hehn slid home. The fireworks came to an abrupt end when E. Tyrrell knocked a little pop-up to first and Rogers held it with Estes and F. Lindsay already down.

Two runs in the last of the seventh gave the Machinists their eight marks to the Typos' nine.

Rock Island and Typos will again meet Friday. Oilers and Barbers are playing today.
