EARLY LEAD WINS GAME FOR MINCO

"Lefty" Taylor Has "Off Day" and Loss is Five Runs in First Inning; Score Middle of Ninth 6 to 2

BOND'S MEN ARE GREAT FIELDERS

Rob Verdenites of Hits Time After Time; Westsiders Get Their Two Runs in First of Fourth

Taylor's failure to withstand the slugging of the Minco Braves in the first inning lost the game for Verden at University park yesterday. Minco won, 6-2. Five of those six scores were made against the Chickasha portlander, Blass succeeded him before the end of the first inning.

In holding down the opposition on hits, Nels Jones, the Minco twirler, had Blass outtaressed. That is, the box score points to that conclusion, but many Verden men were robbed of hits by the great work of Minco fielders. Willie Weller, Indian third baseman, gathered in two that would no doubt have been hits if they had landed in anyone else's territory. Though but one error was chalked up against the Verden men, they lacked the so-called "lucky chances" on which Minco retired man after man.

But for all that, it was only the merciless slaughter of Taylor's first inning curve that gave the game to Minco with Blass taking the mound before the beginning of the second. Parnell, first man up, went to first on an error by Thompson. Verden shortstop, then Heffner singled, Reynolds and Lawrence each doubled, they threw Weller out, second to first. Campbell singled and Johnson doubled, the little bee scoring Parnell, Reynolds, Heffner, Lawrence and Campbell. Blass relieved Taylor after Johnson got his two-bagger. Whitman and Jones both flew out, the first to Anspacker and the latter to R. Dayton.

Jones didn't fan many of the Verden men. He gave the Indian catcher, Lawrence, chance for only three putouts on three strikes each, but these Minco men fired the ball down to first base like big leaguers. Liles and Thompson, the first two men to go to the plate, got singles, but both were caught on the bases and R. Dayton flew out to Weller.

They didn't get another hit until the fourth, when, with one man down, Thompson drove one over second base, R. Dayton hit safe to left, then Witherspoon, the Chickasha man playing first base for Verden, sent one right down the third base line good for two sacks. He scored both Thompson and R. Dayton, then died on second when Dayton made the mistake of trying Weller on a drive and Anspacker sent a grounder to the same territory.

Not until the first half of the last inning did Verden seem to have a chance of scoring again. Thompson shoved the ball right into the pitcher's hands, then R. Dayton hit safe to left field, but Witherspoon knocked a fly to first base before the other Dayton got a clean one to right, where his brother had landed his. With two men on and two down, Anspacker sent a grounder near enough to first base that Campbell was able to get it with-out aid.

Minco got their only score with Blass in the box in the seventh inning. Parnell struck out. Heffner got a safety by lining it just over the infield, Reynolds walked and they caught Heffner trying to steal second, but Lawrence and Weller both hit safe, registering Reynolds. Campbell struck out, leaving two men on.

Flem and Jacobs took turns eating balls and strikes and unringing bases. The tabulated score:
