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Initiate Home Credit Plan at West School

Announcement of the launching of a "home credit plan," at the West school building was made today by G. E. Meade's, principal. Mr. Meade issued the following statement: "It is a recognized fact that many school children are of very little service to their parents, also that there is a very large number who have little or no training in personal hygiene. Believing that there should be an additional amount of training along these lines, the teachers of the West building have decided to offer what is known as the home credit plan. This means not only extra work on the part of the teacher, but the earnest and honest co-operation of the parent. In fact the parent will have to give some time to the keeping of a correct account of the pupil's credits, but in the long run it will mean a saving of time, as the pupil will be doing work that the parent would have to do."

- Class A—Grades 4-7, inclusive. Sweeping and dusting one room, 10 credits. Brushing in coal and kindling, each 5 credits. Washing dishes, 10 credits. Drying dishes, 5 credits. In class A a premium of five dollars will be given to the pupil who has the highest number of credits at the end of the school year; \$2.50 will be given to the one having second highest. In class B, handsome premiums, suited to the winners, will be given to the two highest.


