### SAFER THAN FOOTBALL

Frank Moran Compares College Game With That of Boxing.

Rough Handling in Ring Pleasant Dream Compared to Treatment Received on Gridiron—Fighting Supposed to Be Brutal.

Frank Moran, who is a leading contender for the heavyweight title, was perusing the football results recently in New York. The football columns receive Frank's attention first in any newspaper.

"Ah, that's the game for you!" enthused Moran. "Football is one of the greatest games in the world—and the toughest. Boxing is a cinch when compared with football. I know. I have played at both games. I played football regularly for three years and pardon me if I say I was a pretty fair player. In 1908 I studied dentistry at the University of Pittsburgh and played with its football team. After that I played left tackle on the Pittsburgh Lyceum, a high-class professional team that toured the surrounding country and met the best pro teams as the Easter Superbats, Canton Tigers and the Columbus Pandemic eleven. So you see I know what I am talking about," concluded Moran.

"Yes, sir, fighting is supposed to be a brutal sport and is being legislated against in some parts of the country, but let me tell you that I have been battered and banged more in one football game than during all my career in the ring. In the ring you fight one man, on the gridiron you have eleven to battle.

"The worse beating I ever received as a boxer was a pleasant dream compared with the rough handling I have

been showered with on the football field. Once Jim Savage gave me two black eyes and they stopped the fight because I looked bad, and once Gunboat Smith knocked me down. That is all the damage I ever suffered in the ring. But on the gridiron—'Whee!' laughed Moran.

"Them was the rough days. I was laid out more than once and suffered bruises and bumps galore, and a broken rib, too.

"And they call fighting brutal," went on the blond Pittsburgh boy. "Well, do you imagine for an instant that a chap could play in 200 football games? Many of our boxers, past and present, have engaged in over 200 fights. Gans, Dixon, Baldwin, Attell and others have done so. No football player could play two hundred games unless he possessed a feline number of lives.

"Boxing is a large and successful profession. Professional football is a failure. Why? Because football is the toughest of the two."

I played golf every Sunday, rain or shine, and as I often said to
