## Short Stories OF THE TOWN

**U. D. C. Meeting.**

**To Hot Springs.**  
M. F. Courtney, president of the Farmers' State bank, who left Chickasha this afternoon for the meeting of the Oklahoma Bankers' association, expects to go from Oklahoma City, following the adjournment of the meeting, to Hot Springs, Ark., where he will remain several weeks.

**Glorify for Two Golfers.**  
As the horrible details of the tourney in which Chickasha golf players participated at Oklahoma City last week, leak out, it develops that at least two local players won more glory than was credited to them by the newspaper reports. Hugh Neeley Smith Jr., and G. Blackburne beat Colonel Roy Stafford and Mr. Frederickson, crack members of the Oklahoma City club, both in the handicap match, which was part of the tourney and in an individual match without handicap at the close of the big battle. The players are proud of the prowess of their champs.

**Police Court.**  
Judge Coffman called three cases this morning in police court, two for immoral conduct and one for disturbing the peace. The defendants were Charles Pruitt, white man, and Ellenora Oliver, negro woman. Fine of \$10 in each case. In the matter of a white woman charged with disturbing the peace, the defendant being out on a cash bond in the sum of \$10 and failing to appear, the case was passed until this afternoon. Judge Coffman stated this morning that a great deal of complaint had been made to the police against certain men of the city who belong to the class which may be termed as "undesirables." "I am, going to make this city too hot to hold these fellows and my work this morning may be called nothing more than a start-er," said the judge.

**Roast Beef East Indian Style.**  
Fry an onion in a little butter till a golden brown, add a chopped green pepper and half a teaspoonful of curry powder. Then pour in the gravy or a cupful of tomato juice, also a few drops of Worcestershire sauce. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Cut the meat in neat squares and heat in the sauce. ## ANSWERS TO CHARGE OF TREASON

**Sir Roger Casement, Former Favorite in British Consular Service, Faces Bow Street Court; Attorney General Reviews Career**

London, May 15.—Shuffling in shoes requisitioned from the British army, clad in a dark seamy suit, the coat frayed at the sleeves, his face covered with slovenly stubble of almost greenish beard, Sir Roger Casement, former favorite of the British consular service, went to trial today on the charge of high treason before the Bow street court.

The attorney general, Sir F. E. Smith, read the formal charge, reviewing the career of Casement. He stated that the German auxiliary cruiser, which was sunk off the Irish coast when Casement landed, carried twenty-thousand rifles, a million rounds of ammunition and ten machine guns, together with many bombs for the rebels.

**French Report Victories.**

Paris, May 15.—The French army today reports two victories, claiming to have cleared the Germans from trenches west of Monttetu and the capture of a first line trench near Verdunville.

**Russ Near Turks.**

Petrograd, May 15.—The Russians have crossed the frontier southwest of Lake Urumish into Persia, and are now within eighty miles of the main line of Turkish communications toward Bagdad. They have already penetrated several miles into the interior.

**Punjab Forests.**  
The jand forests of the Punjab are spread over the arid, alluvial plains, where, as a rule, the rainfall does not exceed ten inches. The area covered is 3,500 square miles. It is chiefly remarkable owing to the length of its tap-root, specimens having been found with a tap-root as much as 84 feet in length, descending vertically to a depth of 64 feet. This tap-root enables the tree to obtain its water from the permanent water supply in the subsoil. Doubtless at one time the jand lived in a region liable to floods, since it has been found that no natural regeneration occurs in the jand forests, though in irrigated or flooded districts the jand is reproduced readily from seed. It seems probable that the explanation of the long tap-roots is due to the effort on the part of the tree to keep pace with the gradual lowering of the water table of the soil, resulting from the lowering of the river beds by erosion.
