



NEW PATROL BOAT ON SPEED TRIAL



Patrol boat No. 2 on her speed trials in Lynn bay, making an average of 24 miles an hour. The trials were pronounced satisfactory under the direction of Stewart Davis, who is commander of the Volunteer Patrol squadron. The No. 2 is the first of the fleet of four now under way. These new type patrol boats are 40 feet over all, 8 feet 8 inches beam, and 3 feet draft, fitted with 235-horse-power engines.

BANQUET IS POSTPONED TO TUESDAY

The Men's Dinner Club banquet is unavoidably postponed from Thursday next as announced till next Tuesday evening, the 30th of May, at 8 p. m., at the Early hotel. Messrs. Birchfield & Remler, new owners of the Early, offer a banquet menu that promises to excel any heretofore provided for the club. The seating capacity will be 120 persons. As 89 were served in April it is expected that the entire 120 plates will be reserved early, so members are requested to reserve plates for themselves and any friends whom they may wish to entertain as guests, before Monday next. It is essential that members who order plates be present; send a substitute if absence is necessary, or pay part of the cost, as though present. This is the most essential feature of these banquets, and if the club is to continue without regular monthly dues, each member must co-operate in this respect. No requirement is made for attendance but after a plate is reserved by the committee it is expected that someone

will appear to occupy the place or pay the price. This statement is made because last month seventeen reservations were made, which were not occupied, and only two of this seventeen sent the 85c, and if it had not been for extra visitors who came in at the last hour, the committee would have been burdened by having to pay for the folks who promised to come and did not, and who failed to pay. It is hoped that the plan as originally made can be carried out so that folks who want to attend pay for what they get, and no pay if not in attendance; this may be carried out if those attend or pay who order plates.

The banquet will be on the evening of Decoration Day, and proper decorations will be carried out, and proper music provided, if possible. Remember, a good time is promised, a real banquet, only 120 can be accommodated, and members come first, if they reserve first; starting on the minute of 8 p. m. to be through by 10 p. m.; no long, but pithy and witty, and even very logical and eloquent speeches, and lots of fun and jokes. If an earlier hour could have been arranged it would have been, but it is impossible this time. Hold your appetite till 8 p. m. and you will not regret the denial of usual early dinner.—The Arrangement Committee, by D. H. Roche, Chairman.


