TRUST LAW DECLARED DEFECTIVE

President Van Hise Says Act Must Be Amended; Business Men Want Line Drawn Between Co-operation and Monopoly

By United Press. Chicago, Ill., May 31.—Declaring the Sherman anti-trust law should be modified to permit business interests to co-operate and promote, not restrain, trade, President Charles R. Van Hise of the University of Wisconsin was applauded long and loud at the opening session of the National Lumber Manufacturers' convention here today.

The address was declared particularly appropriate at this time, when business men in all lines of American trade are trying to have the new federal trade relations committee given authority to pass on co-operative contracts between business concerns.

They want the line drawn between advantageous co-operation and blighting monopoly.

President Van Hise, who went before a committee of congress recently and asked the amending of the anti-trust law to permit the lumber manufacturers to curtail production, under federal regulation, to a point which would make it possible for them to profitably conserve their forest supplies for future generations, explained his views on this point. He declared that under present conditions it might be possible for an industry to waste its entire future natural supply to meet a present demand.

Mayor William T. Thompson opened the convention. R. A. Long of Kansas City responded. The annual address of the president was then made by President R. H. Downman of New Orleans.

At the afternoon session Dr. Herman von Schrenk of St. Louis read a paper on tests of fire-resistant paints, in which he touched on the latest move of the nation's lumbermen, to find means for making the nation's lumber material non-inflammable.

DUTCH WAR MOVE DUE TO ALLIES

By United Press. The Hague, May 2.—(By mail)—Despite the statements of certain pro-English newspapers, it is now known authoritatively that it was fear of the allies, and not of Germany, that prompted the Dutch government to take war-like measures a month ago.

Certain reports reaching the Dutch government about steps taken by the allies at the Paris conference caused grave concern here.

The minister of war informed newspaper men that the government was expecting an economic crisis of great importance, though he refused to go further in his statement.

Evidently in anticipation of sharp measures by the allies, the government chartered several steamers and sent them to America for wheat.

Measures taken by the British government to enforce the blockade of Germany are steadily becoming more irritating to the Dutch.

This does not mean, however, that the anti-German feeling of the greater part of the people of Holland has been lessened.

Hollanders are generally convinced that Germany has respected Dutch neutrality in this war only because she depends upon Holland for her food supplies.

The people blame high food prices upon Germany because exportations to the kaiser's realm have lessened the supply here.

The people of Holland want to be let alone by both sides.

M'BURNETT IS SHOCKED

B. B. McBurnett, an employe of the city waterworks department, had a narrow escape from serious injury, if not electrocution, yesterday afternoon while working on water pipes beneath the store occupied by the Bullard Dry Goods company. In attempting to force a displaced water pipe into position, Mr. McBurnett grabbed the pipe in his hands, finding out, too late that the conduit which carried the electric lighting wires into the building, had come in contact with the water pipe at a point where the insulation was broken on the conduit.

The water pipe was heavily charged with electricity from the short-circuiting of the conduit and Mr. McBurnett was unable to turn loose of it. The voltage was sufficiently heavy to throw McBurnett about the compartment in which he was working, but not sufficient to shock him into insensibility or to burn him severely. In finally releasing himself from the charged pipe, McBurnett pulled the fixtures which held it loose from the wall and broke the connection with the conduit.

SHERIFF IS HELD UP BY BROTHER SHERIFF

Yesterday morning, before leaving for Anadarko in pursuit of Charley Crisp, one of the escaped alleged burglars of the Mattox pool hall, Sheriff Bailey phoned the sheriff of Caddo county, at Anadarko, that the escaped man was heading for Anadarko and to look out for him. The Caddo sheriff, acting upon the hypothesis that the man wanted had not yet arrived at Anadarko, climbed into an auto and headed toward Chickasha, thinking to meet Crisp on the road and arrest him. In place of meeting Crisp, the Caddo sheriff, when a few miles east of Anadarko, met Sheriff Bailey who was traveling toward that city as fast as gasoline and rubber tires could carry him.

YOUTHFUL DELINQUENTS ARRESTED AT ALEX.

Ralph Tidwell, Artie Collier and Aaron Burtram, boys of twelve and thirteen years, all of Alex, were arrested by D. Arthur Wilson and arraigned before Judge R. E. Davenport of the county court this morning on charges of having burglarized the stores of W. J. Jahn and Mrs. A. L. Ramsey, of Alex. The offenses with which the boys stand charged were committed on the night of Feb. 20. Judge Davenport set the hearing of the cases against the youthful delinquents for Monday morning, June 5, at 9 o'clock.

CRISP ARRAIGNED.

Charley Crisp was arraigned before Judge Fuller this morning on charges contained in the information filed by County Attorney Venable charging burglary. Defendant stated that he wished to enter a plea of guilty and was ordered held to the district court in the sum of \$1,500, and was remanded to jail in default of bond. Crisp was the companion of Dan Kelley in the burglarizing of Clyde Mattox's pool hall Monday night.
