## TO GET SERVICE FROM LAMP

Scrupulous Cleanliness and Proper Treatment of the Various Parts is Imperative.

A lamp in the living room burning brightly adds coziness to the scene, but what is worse than a smoking lamp or one with an unpleasant odor? It is very easy to overcome any such tendencies. Simply keep all parts of the lamp scrupulously clean. Soak the wick and occasionally the burner, for an hour in strong, clear vinegar; rinse in clean, fresh vinegar; dry thoroughly before using. The lamp or oil heater thus treated will throw out a brighter light or greater heat.

As to chimneys—put each one before using in an agate vessel with cold water which more than covers it. Bring the water to a boil and let it boil for ten minutes. Then take the vessel from the fire and let the chimney remain in the water until cold. Thus treated chimneys last longer; this applies to all blown glassware.

Never cut a wick. Scrape it with a card.

## Good and Bad French.

With the practice of making French speeches to French-speaking audiences, no fault can reasonably be found. It is a decided advantage to the community generally to have English speaking public men able to speak also in French, as there are many French speaking public men who can speak very well in English, and even take a keen and effective part in parliamentary debates.
