SESSION OF AD MEN IS CONTINUED

By United Press. Philadelphia, Pa., June 26.—"Advertising pays!" This phrase was on the tongue of 10,000 delegates when they gathered today in the University of Pennsylvania's buildings for twenty-two departmental conferences in connection with the convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World.

The meetings today marked the amalgamation of the purveyors of nearly one billion dollars a year in advertising.

Two great mass meetings will be held this afternoon in the Commercial Museum, where the general discussions of the convention are being held.

Among the advertising authorities who will address the meetings are, Cyrus H. K. Curtis, of the Curtis Publishing Company; R. Goodwin Rhett, president of the National Chamber of Commerce; Adolph S. Oebe, of the New York Times; and N. C. Kingsbury, vice president of the American Telephone & Telegraph company.

Final preparations were also made today for the gigantic and spectacular pageant tonight in which 5,000 persons and 100 floats will be in line, to demonstrate the progress of advertising.

The first phase of American advertising will be portrayed by 30 Indians at the head of the procession escorting a great barge containing an Indian camp with tepees and illustrating how they advertised with their totem poles and war cries.

To illustrate the second phase, 50 town criers in colonial costumes will carry hand painted signs and ring bells. The Philadelphia floats will be conspicuous for their originality. The first will be called "The Spirit of Modern Advertising." Ben Franklin will follow, and then the floats of the big industrial and business houses.

DARKY SONG FESTIVAL IN DALLAS

By United Press. Dallas, Tex., June 26.—"The Dallas Blues," a song just chuck full of minor; "Roll, Jordan, Roll," and "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot" are some of the songs 500 trained negro singers will recall to Dallas tonight when the Southern Negro Folk Song Festival begins in an open-air theater.

With camp-meeting settings, the dusky vocalists will sing camp-meeting songs that never have been written; songs which have been handed down from ante-bellum days, while white delvers into negro lore have vainly tried to record them.

Former slaves will sing the plaintive plantation melodies by which they worked in the cotton fields half a century ago and younger negroes will interpret real ragtime, the songs which musical authorities say are the root of the cabaret songs of today.

The white population of Dallas will patronize the festival freely, according to the advance sales. Sections of seats are apart for whites and negroes.

WAR ODDITIES.

Reading, Eng., June 26.—Eleven conscientious objectors to military service here were sentenced to four months imprisonment each for refusing to undergo for medical examination.
