There are no indications that any of the principal belligerents are near the point of exhaustion. Even if the ring which the allies are endeavoring to draw about the Central Powers is made much smaller, the Teutons will still be in a position to prosecute the contest for a long time within their own borders.

A REAL GOOD ROADS REVIVAL

We have had many spells of good roads enthusiasm in the past, only to recover from them without leaving any tangible results. Now we are in the midst of another one and the question is: Is it going to be the real thing or more mere talk? It all depends upon whether we generate enough vigor during the next few days to make the movement that is in progress accomplish its mission. An effort is being made to bring the citizens of all sections of the county together in a meeting here Saturday for the purpose of agreeing on a course of action. It is useless to start out with any plan unless there is reason to believe that it will command the support of the people. By bringing the representative citizens of the various communities together it should be possible to map out a program that will be approved. That Grady county needs better roads and bridges will not be questioned and common-sense tells us that we ought to have them now. Every day that we put up with present conditions is costly. What we want is first-class highways for the people living now, not for future generations. It is to be hoped that the citizens of Chickasha and all the other towns in the county, together with the farmers, will respond to the call for the good roads meeting here Saturday to the end that there may be a general agreement as to the best method to pursue with a view to getting speedy

FAVORS BONDS FOR ROADS AND BRIDGES

In a recent issue the Alex Tribune came out strongly in favor of voting bonds for roads and bridges in Grady county. In the course of an editorial the Tribune said: "It would be a splendid thing for Grady county to enjoy deservedly the reputation of having the best roads and bridges in the peerless state of Oklahoma. Commercial importance, industrial eminence are ours. There is no surer road to commercial and agricultural greatness than by superbly maintained highways and steel bridges. "The added expense of a few dollars will be saved every taxpayer affected, in wear and tear on autos and vehicles. "The wooden bridges that span our streams are a reproach to the civilization of Grady county. "A bond issue for \$100,000 ought to carry by a majority that will be an assurance, even an inspiration. "We now have a fund of only \$24,000 for bridge building and repairs. The county commissioners have estimated the annual cost of the upkeep of our present bridges and fixed the amount at \$10,000 yearly. This is a small fund and the repairs each year will necessarily increase. "Give this matter a fair and impartial hearing before reaching for your hammer."

THE PEACE PARTY

The Democratic party is the peace party, and has been since the foundation of the republic, because when war must come it is the democracy of the nation that must do the fighting, says the McAlester News-Capital. In 1811 Thomas Jefferson, in a letter to the patriot Kosciusko, said: "We have, therefore, remained in peace, suffering frequent injuries, but on the whole multiplying, improving, prospering beyond all example. "It is evident to all that in spite of great losses greater gains have ensued. When these gladiators shall have worried each other into ruin or reason, instead of lying among the dead on the bloody arena, we shall have acquired a growth and strength which will place us beyond insult. "Peace, then, has been our principle, peace is our interest, and peace has saved the world this only plant of free and rational government now existing in it. "However, therefore, we may have been reproached for pursuing our Quaker system, time will affix the stamp of wisdom on it, and the happiness and prosperity of our citizens will attest its merit. And this, I believe, is the only legitimate object of government, and the first duty of governors—and not the slaughter of men and the devastation of countries placed under their care. "How desirable, then, it must be in a government like ours, to see its citizens adopt individually the views, the interests and the conduct which their country should pursue, divesting themselves of those passions and partialities which tend to embarrass and em-


"Yes, I know," answered Schmidt easily, "but I never saw a hippopotamus until two weeks ago."
