**BOOSTING GOOD ROAD TO LAWTON**

**Delegation from Caddo County Receive Encouragement in Proposition to Connect Two Cities**

with Lawton in building a good road between the county seats of Grady and Comanche counties regardless of whether it is a part of the Ozark Trail or not. This was the substance of a motion adopted at a meeting of citizens this afternoon at the Commercial and Farm bureau room, called for the purpose of conferring with a committee of Lawton men who came on a good roads mission.

The Lawton delegation included Jake Talmadge, W. O. Weaver and James Travis, all members of the board of county commissioners; Dr. E. S. Gooch, E. T. Warren, Pearl P. Little, A. D. Lawrence, Bob Moffatt and Bob Dillworth.

Speaking for the visitors, Mr. Moffatt said, "We have traveled over the proposed road from Lawton to Chickasha today, coming via Fletcher and Cement. Lawton and Comanche county are prepared to put this road in first class condition. We have the funds and mean business. We want Chickasha to join with us, carrying the Grady part of the road to the Caddo county line."

Ben Johnson, J. W. Kayser, T. H. Dwyer and others discussed the matter, all favoring co-operation with the Lawton citizens in building the road. It was pointed out that it was immaterial to Chickasha whether the Ozark Trail was routed through Lawton or Mangum but Chickasha was ready to take on any good roads proposition that was practicable and it was believed that a road from here to Cement would be of great benefit to the trade interests of this city.

County Commissioner Robinson said a state highway had already been laid off from Chickasha to the county line not far from Cement and it was planned to put this road in first class condition by the first of the year.

Speaking of good roads in general Mr. Warren of Lawton said, "I came from a state of good roads. I have seen land values increase from \$10 to \$150 per acre on account of good roads. I believe you could spend \$200,000 for good roads in your county and in ten years it would double the value of your land." Mr. Warren stated that it was planned to hard-surface both the Ozark Trail and the Meridian road in Comanche county.

On motion of J. W. Kayser, E. E. Colby, president of the local Ozark Trail association, and J. J. Merrill, secretary, were requested to take the Lawton-Chickasha road in hand, with the view to assisting in making the necessary improvements on the Grady county part of it.

"I feel that the proposition brought by our Lawton friends is a good one and should be accepted," said Ben F. Johnson in the course of a talk.

"Every good road is an asset no matter where it is built," said T. H. Dwyer. "A road from Chickasha to Cement would be of great benefit to Chickasha. I have no doubt that money spent for good roads will increase land values."

Mr. Robinson stated that there was practically no sand to be overcome on the road from Chickasha to Cement. "We will have some bridges to build and some hills to be graded down and then we shall have a reasonably good road."
