You will recall that an effort was made to have a county-wide roads meeting on the last day of the fair but various things interfered with it. However, representatives from a number of the smaller towns were present and a temporary organization was effected with Dr. Gordon of Ninnekah as present president.

Dr. Gordon has sent out a call for the meeting tonight and all sections of the county are expected to have delegates present. As citizens of Chickasha we cannot afford to be indifferent toward this meeting. We have asked the other towns of the county and the farming communities to cooperate with us in this movement and it is up to us to show them that we are in earnest about the matter.

It will not do to go on the assumption that the other fellows will be there and hence it isn't necessary for you to go. Nobody can do your duty for you and you shouldn't expect such a thing. Chickasha is vitally interested in good roads and it behooves every man in the town to be wide awake and ready to do his part. Let's come alive and make the meeting tonight generate enough good roads enthusiasm to sweep the county.

WALLOWING IN PROSPERITY

Except when we see the actual figures, of what now is in comparison with what was, it is impossible to believe the extent of the prosperity in which the United States is now fairly wallowing. A few comparisons, taken from a recent issue of the Wall Street Journal, tell the story far better than words:

The average price of railway stock on Sept. 16 was 109.16; a year ago it was 95.73. The average price of industrials was 149.29, as against 105.18 a year ago.

On September 16, 1916, September wheat sold in Chicago for 147 1/2 as against 101 1/4 a year ago; September corn for 86 1/2 against 71 1/2; October cotton for 15.28 as against 10.54.

On that same day Atchison stock sold for 106 5/8 as against 102 a year ago; Pennsylvania 156 5/8 against 109 3/8; Union Pacific 147 3/8 against 131; United States steel 107 1/4 against 75 5/8.

gaining prominence with the farmers very fast and the acreage will be 100 per cent better this year than ever before in Grady county.

"Dan Stevens has an actual investment of \$60,000. He owns and controls this fertile Washita bottom for three miles and thousands of bushels of corn are now ready to be harvested. He is busy erecting an elegant residence in Ninnekah where he will soon move in order to get his children to school. He has just finished seeding 100 acres of wheat. With an elegant farm, wheat, alfalfa, corn, red hogs and good cattle, Mr. Forsyth has solved the problem of raising the purchase money for his property and today he has one among the best regulated farms in that section of the county.

"The cotton farmers of that section are getting a reasonable good yield and with the extra price they receive for the cotton and seed makes it a very busy season in that section.

"At Tabler we found Ross Heaney busy loading his Jersey cattle for the state fair at Oklahoma City. The gin was running in full blast and we saw more bales of cotton than at any place we visited this season on the yard. J. B. Roberts had just finished ginning his eighth bale this season.
