PHOTOGRAPHERS WANTED BY U. S.

Camera Men for Aviation Corps Which is Now One of Important Branches of Army. Sergeant John J. Coone, in charge of the United States Army recruiting station, has just received orders that photographers are needed in the aviation section of the signal corps. The United States government is in a very short time going to largely increase the aviation department of the army. "In days gone by the cavalry was charged with securing information. Now in modern warfare, the condition is changed. An army without a good aerial fleet would be absolutely helpless. The aviators fly over the enemy and ascertain its strength and equipment. No movement can be made without the aviators' knowledge. The famous cavalry screen used with much success by Generals P. H. Sheridan, Stonewall Jackson and J. E. B. Stuart would be impossible in the day of the aeroplane. The photographers used in the aviation service have an excellent opportunity to secure promotion," said Sergeant Coone today.

FIRE LADDIES GET \$5 RAISE

Four members of the fire department are rejoicing in an increase in salary of \$5 a month, the ones affected being T. F. Awrey, Ed Downey, Sherrod Roland and Carl Williams. In the ordinance which was passed on Thursday night the city council authorized an increase in salaries of members during their first six months of service to \$55 a month, the second six months to \$60 and the third six months to \$65. The pay of those who have served eighteen months consecutively remains the same, \$70. The salaries of the chief and captains remain unchanged.

FURTHER FLOW OF OIL REPORTED AT CEMENT

The Oklahoman today printed the following from its Anadarko correspondent: A good flow of oil was struck Friday afternoon in the test well on the Kunzmilller farm near Cement. At a depth of 1000 feet the well began to flow and the oil ran in a small stream to a creek about fifty yards away. Drilling has been suspended but will be resumed after the well is cleaned.
