The change in name has been brought about by the change in the kinds of intoxicants that are served.

Men Drink Anything
While the favorite pastime some years ago, just outside Oklahoma, was stepping up to the bar and ordering "Old Taylor and Rock and Rye," and other favorite beverages, the orders have changed and one hears about lemon extracts, hair tonic, Jick (jamica ginger), bay rum, Chlorofora, ammonia colic, and chief among the lighter concoctions is choctaw beer.

"In the days of the saloon I saw men drink and get drunk on most everything possible, and the effects of some of the drinks were terrible but I never saw anything to equal the effects that the intoxicating drinks today have upon men. Some men will drink anything that gives any kind of peculiar sensation," Chief Linn said.

"The few drunk men we get at the jail now are just simply crazy. They are not merely drunk. For several hours after we put them in jail they get worse instead of better. When these men get over their drunk they are absolutely exhausted. This stuff they are drinking now will certainly kill them and in a very short time," the chief declared.

Another meeting of the Chickasha post has been called for next Tuesday evening, at which time arrangements will be made to organize various branches of the post in the towns of Grady county.

A membership committee composed of Sergt. Ernest R. Smith, in charge of the local army recruiting station; Mayes Jones, Joe Burney, J. L. Powers, J. R. Murray, and K. P. Estes was appointed last night.

This committee will conduct a campaign this week and Monday and Tuesday of next week in an attempt to materially increase the membership of the local post. It is hoped by L. E. Emanuel, post commander, to send a large delegation from Grady county to the state convention to be held soon in Oklahoma City. The post will be entitled to one delegate for every ten members.

To Vote on Measures
A committee, made up of George F. Rice, post adjutant; George White,

post historian, and Mr. Aldridge, was named last night to investigate the merits of the measure affecting World War veterans now pending in the United States congress.

This committee will make a report in the very near future, following which the post will vote to go on record approving or disapproving the measure.
