New Federation in Athletic World Is Away to Big Start

New York, Dec. 20.—The National Amateur Athletic Federation of America got away to a flying start in its first annual convention yesterday and formally assumed its place in the athletic world. The meeting was conducted with every indication that the new organization was here to stay.

The federation, it was explained at some length by various speakers, is in no way a controlling body and its purpose is not to usurp the power and duties of the various separate organizations of which it is composed. All of which appears to have been a roundabout way of informing the A. A. U. that the latter organization need feel no apprehension in joining the federation. Even though the federation counts within its ranks almost twenty separate national organizations, they are organizations which are more or less sufficient unto themselves, whose activities are not likely to overlap.

The A. A. U., however, presents a different problem. It has for so many years practically dictated certain rules governing certain sports that it would be a hard blow indeed should it be forced to surrender some of this authority to a more powerful organization. Hence the caution.
