UTAH OIL INDUSTRY DRAWS ATTENTION

GOVERNMENT DESCRIBES THE GREAT SAN JUAN FIELDS.

Considerable Wildcat Drilling in Sanpete and Juab Counties—Nine Producing Wells in Southeastern Utah and Six in Washington—Available Oil Possibilities Near Zion.

Those who are interested in the oil industry of the country will find a bulletin just issued by the United States geological survey timely and instructive. This bulletin is prepared by David T. Day and it handles the production of petroleum for many years past up to and including 1911, with the output by states and by counties in each state, Utah and Wyoming being given attention. In regard to Utah the bulletin says in part:

"Oil has been produced in Utah in both the Virgin field on the eastern edge of Washington county and in the San Juan field in the southern part of San Juan county, and interesting occurrences of oil have also been noted in the Dragon field on the eastern edge of Uintah county, near the town of that name, and in the field about fifteen miles west of Vernal. Natural gas has also been noticed and even obtained to a slight extent by drilling on the east shore of Great Salt Lake. In the northeastern part of Great Salt Lake a well is being drilled for asphaltic oil. In addition, considerable wildcat drilling has been carried on for the last two or three years in the Sanpete Valley near Juab and Mt. Pleasant. The Virgin oil field has already been described in this series of reports.

The report then continues with a description of the geological features of the San Juan field, with special emphasis on the difficulties of reaching it, owing to the distance from railroad connections. In the field report for 1911 it is stated that on January 1st there were nine producing wells in San Juan county, six in Washington county and two in Sanpete county. The chemical and physical properties of the San Juan oil are treated exhaustively in a large table.

Utah and Wyoming in 1911 produced 188,695 barrels of oil, the largest in history. Wyoming produced the major portion of this, for the state had a hundred and forty-nine producing wells on January 1, 1911, and a hundred and sixty-nine wells on December 31st. Wyoming experienced a splendid improvement in its various fields and holds unusual promise in this respect.

Father Cushman was the speaker. He paid tributes to the memory of the deceased, who was loved by all who knew him. A special train was run from Salt Lake City for the railroad men who went to Ogden to attend the services. The Order of Railway Conductors, the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and the Knights of Columbus attended, the latter acting as honorary pallbearers. The interment took place in the Mountain View cemetery at Ogden.

Theo. Nicholas, Robert Johnson and Henry Vincent of Colton were taken before Justice of the Peace Jones at Price last Monday and charged with maintaining a nuisance under the provisions of the state liquor law at Colton, where it is alleged, they have been conducting a place where liquor is unlawfully sold. Pleas of not guilty were entered and the case set for hearing for the 17th, the day following the trial for unlawfully selling liquor, of which there is a charge against the same parties. Their bail was fixed at \$150 cash for each or three hundred dollars bonds, except in the case of Vincent, who was permitted to go on his previous bond of five hundred dollars given in the liquor selling case.
