### LARGE CROWD TO COME

Anti-Mormon Fight Will Increase Attendance at N. E. A.

"Ten thousand persons, of whom 7000 will be teachers who are members of the N. E. A., will be in Salt Lake convention week," says J. W. Searson of Manhattan, Kan., publicity director of the National Education association, who arrived in Salt Lake City a few days ago.

Mr. Searson was asked if he believed the anti-Mormon and anti-Utah campaign conducted among members of the N. E. A. in the East by certain organizations, would keep teachers away from the convention. He scoffed at the suggestion.

"The effect will be to bring them here instead of scare them away," he said.

Mr. Searson will open headquarters of his department of the N. E. A. at the hotel today and before the end of the week he will have a corps of stenographers hammering type-

writing machines. He expects to be a pretty busy man but will find time to deliver four lectures on "Reading" at the University of Utah summer school this week. Mr. Searson teaches English at the Kansas agricultural college. He is the author of a reader that is used in the Utah schools.

"Salt Lake is to be congratulated on the preparations it has made for the convention," said Mr. Searson. "It has been widely heralded all over the country. President E. T. Fairchild has written me that he is looking forward to the most successful convention in the history of the association. He is delighted with the work done by D. H. Christensen, A. C. Nelson and their workers of the Utah executive committee. In fact, he expresses himself as delighted with the work of all the committees. He made special mention of the hospitality committee."

Mr. Searson has a list of special trains, bearing delegates, that will arrive the latter part of this week. He is advised that 200 will come on

the Arkansas special, in charge of State Superintendent George Cook, arriving here Saturday morning. When in Nebraska a few days ago, Supt. James E. Dalesell advised him that 200 will leave Lincoln on a special Thursday, arriving here Saturday. The Chicago special, with Mrs. Ella Piagg Young in the party, is expected to arrive Saturday. Sunday noon the Pennsylvania delegation will arrive on a special from Philadelphia, Harrisburg and Pittsburg. In this party will be State Superintendent Nathan C. Shafer and Deputy Superintendent C. H. Tittich. Carroll G. Pearce of Milwaukee, former president of the N. E. A., is expected here Friday. He has written Mr. Searson that Wisconsin will have a large representation at the convention.
