BUSH COMMENCES TO MAKE GOOD

BEGINS TO FULFILL PROMISES TO UTAH.

First Step Is to Construct Additional Yardage Room in Zion—Report That Large Acreage Purchased Years Ago Will Be Utilized For This Purpose.

News of the intention of the Denver and Rio Grande to build new yards in Salt Lake was received on Saturday from Denver by Zion officials. It was stated that the land—between five and six hundred acres—purchased about six years ago will be utilized for the purpose. The plans call for 15,000 feet of track and sidings. D. & R. G. officials say this will greatly facilitate the movement of trains in the Salt Lake freight yards. They say that the new yards are the only improvement of the coming budget that has been announced as a certainty, although it is likely that all the promises made by President Bush will be carried out by the directors.

Hurrying Up Work.

It was stated Saturday in Zion that the Denver and Rio Grande is crowding men and teams into the district plowed by the double track between Thistle and Provo. The force has just been increased to between five hundred and six hundred men, and five steam shovels and several "Jukes" engines are now at work on the grading. The object of the additional forces is to get the grading finished by March 1st. It was also announced that the track will be entirely completed and trains operating over it by June 1st.

When completed the Denver and Rio Grande will nineteen miles more double track. It also makes possible a lower grade on the east bound main line, averaging about 65 per cent.

Coal Output Increasing.

That the principal reason for the improvements on the road is the increase in the coal output of Utah is the statement made by D. & R. G. officials. They say this increase totaled 41 per cent in October; 25 per cent last month, and will, perhaps, be higher this month. They estimate Utah's 1913 coal production at 2,500,000 tons and declare that every dollar spent for coal comes back to the state in the form of money paid out to employes.

Recalls Promises of Bush.

President Bush, when he was the guest of honor at a banquet at the Salt Lake Commercial club on the evening of November 18th, made a three-fold promise to Utah, as follows:

First—The construction of the largest shops of the entire Gould system.

Second—The increase of the coal production in Utah from 2,000,000 tons to 12,000,000 annually within the next five years.

Third—The electrification of 325 miles of the Denver and Rio Grande railway from Grand Junction to Salt Lake.

The announcement by Mr. Bush was wildly cheered by the 200 business men who attended the banquet.

No announcement was made at that time of the intention of building a freight yard at the old Church farm in Salt Lake, but such construction is believed to be but the forerunner of the building of the shops promised by Mr. Bush and to mark the beginning of construction activity by the road on a big scale in the state.

STATE'S TREASURY BALANCE NEARLY MILLION DOLLARS

When the fiscal year of 1913 ended on November 30th the state of Utah had a cash balance in its treasury amounting to \$220,534.42, according to the annual report of State Auditor Lincoln G. Kelly, filed with the governor Wednesday of last week.

MEXICO CONDITIONS VERY CRITICAL

STATE OF GUERRILLA WARFARE THROUGHOUT REPUBLIC.

Two Noted Bandit Chiefs at the Head of Both Rebel and Federal Pillaging Armies—Northern Mexico to Be Ravaged by Huerta.

To the outside observer, at least, matters in Mexico seem to be going from bad to worse. Huerta is reported as broke and in order to carry on his administration has sent his forces to the north with orders to pillage and desolate that portion of the republic.

The rebels are apparently in better shape than ever before and their campaign is gaining in strength and magnitude daily. They have met with few reverses on the battlefield. In fact they have recuperated largely in arms and ammunition from conflicts with the federals.

Of the deplorable condition existing, an exchange makes the following comment:

"Not to be outdone by a mere constitutionalist, Senor Huerta has organized a band of murderers of his very own. Emulating the example of General Carranza who elevated Pancho Villa, former bandit, to a chief lieutenancy, Huerta has conferred a similar honor upon General Salazar, 'the mildest manner'd man that ever scuttled ship or cut a throat.' Placing this renowned bandit at the head of a band of gentle ruffians as modest and retiring as himself, Huerta has commissioned him to lay waste Northern Mexico. Even the carrier pigeon that would seek to cross this pillaged district after the effeminate Salazar has finished with it would need to carry its own provisions."

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mex., Dec. 21.—"Anyone who hereafter loots or molests property of foreigners or Mexicans will be executed. The right to confiscate property will rest only with the rebel government."

Gen. Francisco Villa issued this order today showing his intention to maintain strict military discipline. As an example he executed on the place a band of rebels who had been found guilty by court martial of sacking the home of a wealthy Mexican. While the six rebels were marched before the firing squad the stolen goods were returned to the owner.

Spaniards' Stores Seized.

All stores confiscated from the expelled Spaniards today were closed and sealed. Orders were given that no more goods are to be taken from them. This action was believed to have resulted from the protest of the United States against the seizure of Spanish property. Already great quantities of the goods had been utilized by the rebels. The rest of the property is to be held, pending an investigation whether the owners aided the Huerta government.

General Villa said his forces were being strengthened by desertions from the federal troops. He proclaimed amnesty to federal soldiers who would give up their arms. Many federal troops are reported to have joined the rebels. Three hundred thousand rounds of rifle ammunition and 500,000 rounds of artillery ammunition were recovered from a lake east of Chihuahua, where they were hidden by General Mercado's evacuating federals.
